The rains have subsided but the waters are still muddy and that means fishing still is not very good. There is more debris in the waters than fish. Nevertheless, we expect matters to improve during the spring months.

We did have one excellent result in March. Terry Miller landed a 13 lb . striped bass, fishing in the Delta. Others fished for stripers, but caught very few, and those that were caught were small and below the minimum length. We have given up on trout fishing at Shadow Cliffs Reservoir, although that body of water had fabulous results in December before the rains came. San Pablo Reservoir is usually better than Shadow Cliffs in the late winter and early spring, so Carl Moyer decided to give it a try. He managed to catch a small carp and that was it.

On the other hand, we had another successful annual auction of fishing gear at the March meeting. Our club does not collect dues, so the auction is basically the sole source of our income.

Notwithstanding the dark winter, we believe that the future is bright and we have lots of outings planned. In addition to our regular trips to San Pablo and the Delta, we have trips planned for trout fishing at Lake Almanor, Lake Davis, Collins Lake, Bass Lake, and Los Vaqueros Reservoir; salmon, ling cod, and rock fishing in the ocean; salmon fishing in the Sacramento River; and striped bass fishing at New Hogan Reservoir.

Our next meeting is on Thursday, April $27^{\text {th }}$, at the Legend Sports Bar and Grill at Diablo Creek Golf Course, 4050 Port Chicago Highway in Concord. The meeting starts at 8:30 am, but please join us for breakfast starting at 7:30 am.

The Glass Menagerie catapulted playwright Williams from obscurity to fame. The five-character "memory play" has strong autobiographical elements, featuring characters based on Williams' early life. The play won the New York Drama Critics Circle Award in 1945, and has become a modern classic. Williams later wrote Cat On A Hot Tin Roof and A Streetcar Named DeSire, and went on to be the leading playwright of postWorld War II America.

In The Glass Menagerie, the playwright recalls scenes from his youth during the height of the Depression. Characters include Tom, who works in a shoe factory, his mother, Amanda, always trying to retain a lost gentility in the midst of poverty, his delicate sister Laura, and Tom's friend Jim, the gentleman caller -- a potential suiter -- invited to meet Tom's fragile sister.

A limited number of reduced-price tickets have been set aside for SIR members and guests. Deadline for ordering is June $21^{\text {st }}$.
