## Little Sir's Corner John Kluesener

Our speaker for the month of March was Ms. Debbie Le Vine, the Director of Infrastructure and Management for the California Independent System Operator or CAISO. They are re-

sponsible for making sure that the instantaneous power demand of the citizens of California is met by the various supply systems in and around the State of California. Their goal is to make sure that power is always available and that we are using the least expensive of the available supply sources. Various power suppliers submit their hourly unit rates to CAISO the day prior to the day of supply and CAISO then estimates the power demand based on the season and the expected weather conditions. Since nuclear power is not easily ramped up and down and is relatively low cost, it, as well as wind, solar, run of the river hydro and geothermal, forms the base of the supply.

As Debbie explained power demand increases in the morning hours as households begin to function and offices and industries begin to operate. Demand somewhat flattens during the late morning to mid-afternoon and then rises again as people return home. Because of solar, during much of the day excess power is produced and can be exported, but in the early evening demand outstrips supply as the sun goes down so more expensive gas plants must come on-line to meet demand. This is the time period when power is most expensive and consumers are asked to defer high demand uses like air conditioning, dish washers, ovens etc. if possible. Lots of good information!

Our speaker in April will be Dr. Jon Haveman who heads the National Economic Education Delegation. He will be speaking on the state of the economy and hopefully will be able to enlighten us on the inflation/recession issue and our current banking challenges.

What is a gimmick bicycle rally you ask? It is not a race or an endurance event. A gimmick bicycle rally is a point-to-point ride where riders follow multiple sets of instructions to stay on the proper course. They will be awarded points for recording their progress while on the correct route. Points will be deducted for traveling on the incorrect route. The Rally Master will try to trick the riders into going the wrong way, but at the same time prevent them from getting lost. A rider may be off course and never know it until the end of the

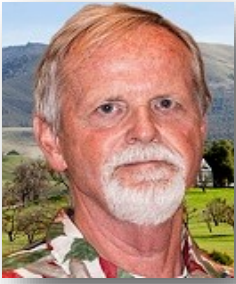

Completed in 1903, the Museum was originally the ranch home of [Hiram Penniman](#), an early Walnut Creek pioneer who came to Walnut Creek in 1850 and eventually owned some 500 acres of fruit and nut orchards in the Ygnacio Valley. The house is furnished with many original family furnishings and treatments. The Shadelands Ranch Historical Museum is operated by the Walnut Creek Historical Society. The 2 docents conducted an outstanding tour explaining the Ranch's history and Hiram's role in the forming the town of Walnut Creek. They also described the many furnishings, dish and glassware, the old wood stove kitchen, and the many pictures of historic value. All enjoyed the outing and then moved on to The Greenery Restaurant for a lovely lunch gassing up at Mount Diablo. 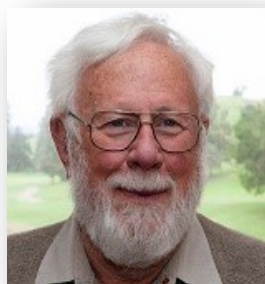

One of our good friends, **Steve Dinning**, let the cat out of the bag that I would be celebrating a significant birthday in another day, and I was thus serenaded by 72 of my best friends with a rousing rendition of "Happy Birthday". I cannot recall a more memorable birthday celebration!

This type of Chinese cuisine is served family style with passed plates which also result in economies of scale so that we were able to have this meal for just \$37 per person, a cost which in these inflationary times was just a distant memory. We had four tables of 10 and four of 8 which also had the benefit of being conducive to good socialization and comradery of our group. We had taken over the restaurant, and while it does not boast of a spacious open space, we managed quite well even during our social hour in chatting elbow to elbow among the dining room tables.

When we finally were seated, we started with some appetizers of pork pot stickers and vegetarian spring rolls followed by the restaurant's classic hot and sour soup.

Then the main dishes were brought out, with one plate after another of the savory Sichuan cuisine, starting with their classic Mongolian Lamb and Prawns with

Honey Glazed Walnuts, always a favorite. Then we enjoyed plates of Hunan Smoked Pork, Lemon Chicken Breast, a Crispy Sweet and Sour Fish filet, and finally a Changsha Beef Clay Pot. For dessert we enjoyed an Eight Precious Ingredients Rice Pudding. It's not only the excellent cuisine but the ability to name their dishes with such exotic names that make this cuisine such an interesting experience.

As we continue in this year having survived the social desert during the pandemic, we will no doubt return to one of the Chinese restaurants in the area to take advantage of the benefits of a fine cuisine and economies of the shared tasty dishes. We have not yet decided where we will enjoy our next Couples Dining Out event. It will likely be in the fourth week in May, possibly on May 22. If we continue to have the large numbers of diners, we may consider a two-day event to have as many as possible enjoy this memorable Branch 146 activity.

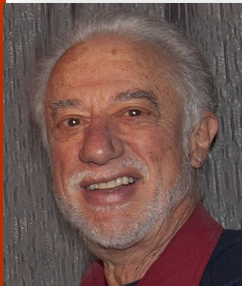
