The table is set for one, symbolizing the frailty of one against many oppressors. The tablecloth is white symbolizing the purity of intention of one who answers his country's call to arms.

The single red rose represents the families who keep the faith awaiting our comrades' return. The red ribbon reminds us of the ribbons worn by thousands bearing witness of an un-dying determination to acquire a proper accounting of missing comrades.

A slice of lemon on the plate reminds us of the bitter fate of some. The salt beside it reminds us of the families' tears as they wait.

It is November and the weather is getting cold and a bit rainy, but the fishing has been terrific. The best action has been trout fishing at Shadow Cliffs Reservoir in Pleasanton. The Shadow Cliffs "season" runs from approximately October to April. It was a bust last year while this year, so far at least, it has been spectacular. Almost everyone has caught limits of fish up to 5 pounds and the fishermen have often been off the water with those limits by 9:30 am. Many members of our club were successful anglers, including Reggie Fromm, Gene Schulting, Lee Clark, and Pete Gates of Branch 146. In addition, Carl Moyer, Terry Miller, and Gordon Linebaugh caught a limit of trout at San Pablo Reservoir just before it closed for the winter.

Out on the Delta, Tom Kostik, Joe Miscione Terry Miller, Joe Karg, Stan Wong, Mike Corker, and Pete Gates had great success fishing for stripers, catching lots of them with several over 20 lbs . Ernie Wong spent three cold, windy days at Pyramid Lake in Nevada but caught and released seven big cutthroat trout, weighing up to 10 pounds fly fishing from a ladder. Howard Berkman picked up porgies fishing in the Atlantic off New York City. Paul Dubow of Branch 146 fished with his son and grandson in Key West and caught and released some large grouper and a bevy of yellow tailed snappers before being grounded by rain and wind.

We also ate as well as fished. Carl Moyer hosted our semi-annual fish fry at his home and the group feasted on smoked salmon appetizers prepared by Tom Boltz of Branch 146 and rockfish and ling cod prepared by Carl and cooked by Gordon Linebaugh, Lee Clark, and Paul Dubow.

We will be very busy this winter fishing for catfish, stripers, sturgeon, and trout. ## Book Group

## Chuck Campbell

The SIR Book Group met Monday, October 31 ${ }^{\text {st }}$, to discuss Strangers in Their Own Land by Arlie Hochschild. She is a Berkeley based sociologist and was attempting to understand why conservative Republicans, who were impacted by severe environmental problems caused by the petrochemical industry, would remain loyal to the Republican cause. Her investigation included five years of interviews with people in small Louisiana communities located among a number of petrochemical industries. The environmental problems confronting the study area included polluted waterways, lost fish and wildlife, and sink holes.

Hochschild made clear to the interviewees her background and the purpose of her study. She found that the local residents wanted the environmental problems to be solved but wanted the State and other local governments, not the Federal government, to take on the problems. There were also some feeling among those interviewed that businesses and industry were able to regulate themselves, and outside regulators were not needed. She also noted a general feeling among many that one would have to live with the industry which caused environmental issues in their area if they wanted jobs and a good economy.

Our group consensus was that the study was conducted fairly and well documented with about a third of the book dedicated to interview notes and references. While limited in geographic scope to a small area of Louisiana, the author was attempting to understand and document the feelings of Tea Party Members (as much as $20 \%$ of the US population agree with their ideas).

For our next book we selected Hero of the Empire by Candice Millard. We will meet on Monday, December $12^{\text {th }}$ at a location yet to be determined.

We had 12 Sirs attending our last meeting and the current group felt that we should limit the group size to 12. Any prospective group members should contact Jerry Kaplan regarding starting a second book group.
