HISTORY OF SONS IN RETIREMENT Realizing the social nature of man and his desire for the company of others, particularly those retired from commercial and professional life, the late **Damian L. Reynolds** conceived the idea of Sons In Retirement in the spring of 1958.

Three friends, all retired, would meet with Mr. Reynolds on occasion for a friendly lunch. He suggested to those three (**Claude Hink, Lorenz Hansen and Wallace Plummer**) that they join him in the idea. A kickoff luncheon was held in the Claramar Restaurant in San Mateo on July 23, 1958. The name "SONS IN RETIREMENT" was unanimously adopted by the eighteen members of the club at a second meeting on August 20, 1958. The chosen name seemed to enunciate and give dignity to retirement, the inevitable lot of most men.

Basic guidelines of the Sons In Retirement were set forth at the time of incorporation of the club in the latter part of 1959. Revisions in the Rules and Procedures have been made from time to time by the State Board of Directors. In 1992, these were compiled in the new SIR Manual. The corporation's copyrighted insignia is the rooster. Quoting the late Mr. Reynolds; "of all the creatures on earth, none expresses more independence and dignity with sureness and aplomb that the rooster. The majesty of his presence is felt in every barnyard, and when he crows he can be heard for miles, not in a fainthearted crow, but with a noise that calls attention to his majestic being." *Past Big Sir, Jack Calloway mused in a recent e-mail; "I once mentioned at a Ladies Day Luncheon that the rooster makes all the noise but the hen does all the work."..ed*

### "DESIGNER" OIL

Crude oil is refined. So is vegetable oil. And refiners say they are soon to have a man made blend of cooking oils that will help you lose weight and

lower your cholesterol. Researchers at McGill University in Montreal have found that persons who eat this new "designer" oil not only increased their metabolism, but also lowered the levels of LDL ("bad") cholesterol by an average of 15 points.

According to research leader **Peter Jones**, Ph.D., "Your liver appears to burn fat from the new oil immediately, rather than storing it for energy later on.". You can expect to see this yet to be named oil, which is a blend of flaxseed oil and other palm oils, on grocery store shelves sometime next year. Source: *Men's Health*, June 2001

# **Know Your SIR** Haradon (Harry) Dillon



Born in St. Paul, Minnesota, on August 17, 1921, the eldest of three children. Lived in Illinois and Oregon, before arriving in Olympia, Washington, at the age of 7. Two years later my father died unexpectedly in the midst of the great depression. I was 9, my sister 7 and my brother was 2. Luckily, our mother was a strong person, who taught us what we could do without and what was important. Although we lost our house to a foreclosure sale, we survived.

Graduated from Olympia High School

in 1938 at the age of 16 with the ambition of becoming a reporter. I worked part time as a reporter for two newspapers, a wire service and then a local radio station. Later I became a radio announcer, doing newscasts, sportscasts, interviews and spinning records. Also did play-by-play for football and baseball games of local high schools and colleges. Worked at KGY Olympia and KVOS in Bellingham, Washington.

When Pearl Harbor was bombed, I quit my job to enlist. Wound up in the Coast Guard, and after serving for 19 months, contracted rheumatic fever while stationed on the east coast. Spent the next ten months in two different naval hospitals and was then released to return to limited duty. Received a medical discharge in 1945 with a 50% disability rating for rheumatic heart disease.

Entered college under the GI bill and received a BSBA degree from the University of Denver, and a JD from Hastings College of Law of the University of California. Began practicing law as a sole practitioner, but 8 years later went to work as an employee of a 2-man law partnership in Oakland.

Married a girl I met in college, had four children, three girls and a boy. The marriage was dissolved in the 60's. In 1969, I married my present wife, Shirley, who had 3 children of her own. We have been blessed with 13 grandchildren, ranging in age from 3 to 23 and scattered from Florida to Okinawa.

The law partnership in which I was employed was incorporated in 1973 and I became an owner at that time. By the time I retired in 1989, the firm had 22 lawyers working for it and I was one of two senior partners. The firm was called McInerney and Dillon, and although I no longer have any financial interest in it, it still goes by the name. From time to time I am called back to help. Operated the Bank of Dillon, financing houses, cars and tuition for the 7 children and their children. Had a

wonderful 80th birthday party this year, with all 7 children and their spouses, 12 of our 13 grandchildren, my sister and brother and Shirley's brother in attendance. Still do all of the family tax returns.

Since our retirement we have traveled a great deal, mostly to Hawaii and Europe and on 8 cruises. We take frequent driving trips, having made two coast-to-coast journeys. We also go to Shirley's home in Nebraska almost every year.

Joined SIR Branch #146 in 1989 and have enjoyed the golf, bridge, travel, and computer groups, but most of all the camaraderie of the members.
