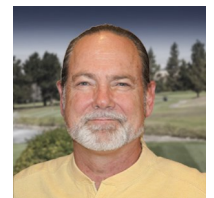

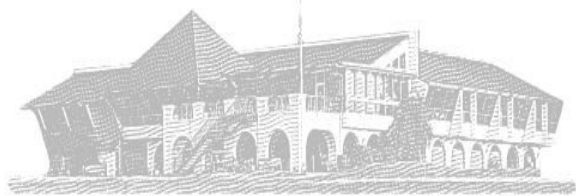
BOB WALTON-DECEASED

Leland Stanford Mansion and Wells Fargo Museum

Your day will begin with a docent led tour of the Leland Stanford Mansion. After a \$22 million restoration, the mansion is now open to the public and serves the citizens of California as the state's official reception center for leaders from around the world. The mansion is a stunning example of splendor and elegance of the Victorian era in California.

On your tour of this beautiful 19,000 square foot mansion you will see: Beautifully restored woodwork, Historic paintings and original period furnishings that belonged to the Stanford Family. After your visit to the Mansion, you are off to lunch at the Old Spaghetti Factory. Then on to the Wells Fargo Museum at the Capital Mall. Here your docent will guide you through the museum, which houses an authentic 1866 Abbot-Downing Stagecoach, a working telegraph line, collection of postal covers, artifacts, documents and even real gold specimens from the area.

Cornerstone Sunset Gardens and Marketplace

Tours are available Monday, Wednesday, and Fridays. We will enjoy a docent led tour of the beautiful Cornerstone Gardens in Sonoma. These ever-changing series of gardens, showcasing innovative designs from international and local landscape architects and designers are a site for those with a "green thumb" as well as the novice gardener. The gardens were inspired by the International Garden Festival at Chaumont-Sur-Loire to create a cultural and creative haven, celebrating art, architecture and nature. Currently there are nine gardens, with five focusing on food production, bee habitat, cut flowers and composting. During your ninety-minute docent led tour you will also visit the Sunset Test Kitchens.

After your tour, your group will enjoy a box lunch in a private garden location. The day would not be complete without time to shop and browse the many unique shops and galleries of Cornerstone.

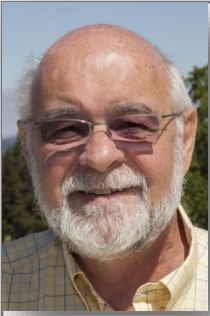

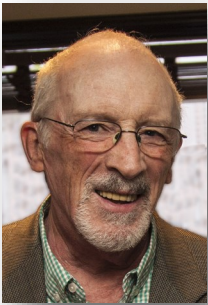
