



Our next function will be a Valentines Dinner at Jack's in Pleasant Hill on February 21st.



If you missed January's meeting, I have links to the YouTube videos that I showed. I put forth some conclusions on which camera is best! It actually depends on what type of pictures you want to take. Below are some examples:

- Long Distance Shots camera with interchangeable 200mm to 400mm lens
- Close up Shots single lens camera that will zoom down to 24mm or less or camera with an interchangeable macro lens
- Fast moving Shots like a sporting event camera that has 1/1000 to 1/2000 shutter speed and good image stabilization
- Taking shots at night or in a dimly lit area a camera that has high ISO capability preferably better than 50,000 with low noise
- Family and Travel shots a modern smartphone that is easy to carry on trips, stores the pictures, and is simple to learn and operate.



As advertised in the last Sir Call, on January. 21st we wound up having a unique and fun dining out experience at **Brasas do Brazil** – a Brazilian Steakhouse. It was a popular venue, and we had 65

diners, all of whom had a great time. We started with our social hour and many of us took advantage of trying the traditional Brazilian cocktail caipirinha — a delicious blend of lime juice, and cachaca — Brazilian sugar cane brandy.

When we started dinner, we went to the abundant salad bar, which had a great variety of salads, cheeses, cold cuts and vegetables. We went in shifts to accommodate our large group. After that we were treated with many varieties of mouthwatering meats presented on skewers by the gauchos who roamed among the tables. We had six kinds of beef, three of pork, a leg of lamb, and several chicken varieties. There is no question that nobody went hungry. After we finished the meal, dessert was a delicious homemade chocolate fudge truffle, along with coffee.

It was generally agreed that it was one of our best dining experiences, and all for a very reasonable cost of \$50, all inclusive — a great deal. (See pictures on next page)

Our next Couples Dining Out event will be in March, likely on Monday March 18th. We have already selected the restaurant and will be going to Aung Maylika, with Burmese cuisine. The Bay Area has one of the largest Burmese populations in the US and we benefit from their unique cuisine. This diverse cuisine is influenced by the myriad ethnic minorities in Myanmar, also influenced by Chinese, Indian and Thai cuisines.

The restaurant is located at 1050 Contra Costa Blvd, on the corner of Willow Pass Road and Taylor. One of the signature starting dishes is the Tea Leaf Salad; and we are still selecting the other dishes. Your hosts have already eaten here twice in negotiating the menu and price.

The restaurant will accommodate about 50 of us but wants a minimum amount for buying out the entire place — not quite as attractive for us. We may do two nights — and will let you know in the next few weeks. Mark your calendar for the March date!

enjoyed by all.






