

Eugene O'Neill Play is SIR Theatre Party for September

The final play by **Eugene O'Neill**, America's most notable playwright, will be presented on Thursday, September 27 as a SIR Theatre Party. The production of O'Neill's *Moon for the Misbegotten* will be staged in the Old Barn at Tao House in the Danville Hills, part of the **Eugene O'Neill** National Historic Site, and the place where O'Neill wrote the play in 1943.

The production is in conjunction with the 75th Anniversary of Tao House, and the Eugene O'Neill Foundation's annual O'Neill Festival. Discussion of the play and the O'Neill National Historic Site will be part of the SIR 146 luncheon program in August, by **Tom Leatherman**, National Park Service Superintendent, and SIR **Gary Schaub**, who is on the Board of the Eugene O'Neill Foundation.


This production of *A Moon for the Misbegotten* is a notable event for drama-lovers, who will want to see this important play presented in the location where it was originally written. O'Neill is the only American playwright to be awarded the Nobel Prize in Literature.

Eugene O'Neill and his wife, Carlotta, built and lived at Tao House from 1937 to 1944. It was here that the playwright wrote his most important plays, including *A Long Day's Journey into Night* and *The Iceman Cometh*, in addition to *A Moon for the Misbegotten*.

Like many of O'Neill's plays, the story of **A Moon for the Misbegotten** has connections to O'Neill's own life and family. This play is a tribute to his brother, Jamie, and it vibrates with love, moonlight, betrayal and truth.

A limited number of discount seats have been reserved for SIR members and guests. Instructions for shuttle pick-up at Danville's Museum of the San Valley on Railroad Avenue will be provided in advance to ticket holders. The performance begins at 8:00 p.m. with shuttle times beginning about 6:30 p.m. so time is available to visit the historic home and grounds.

SIR BRANCH 146 EMERGENCY EVACUATION PLAN

In the event of an emergency, such as a fire or an earthquake, occurring during our monthly luncheon meeting, the Big SIR, or in his absence the Little SIR, will verbally declare the need to evacuate the Boundary Oaks Building according to the following emergency evacuation plan:

The evacuation process will be controlled by zone. Please familiarize yourself with each zone and the zone's designated exit points identified on the Emergency Evacuation Exit Routes diagram shown below, which is also posted on the SIR Branch 146 Website.

All Branch Members are responsible for identifying the zone in which they are located and for assisting any members who have mobility difficulties to the designated exit point for their zone. Zones A and B are located in the Dining Room. Zone C includes the Rear Bar Area and the Men's Toilet. It also includes the Women's Toilet if an emergency occurs during a Ladies' Day luncheon. Most of the Dining Room and Zone B exit points are on level flooring. The zone A and zone C exit points each require using two flights of stairs to ground level. Branch Members in zones A and C with mobility difficulties should exit through the main entrance. Note: the monthly Greeters are responsible for checking that all the designated exit points are clear of obstructions and are functional prior to each luncheon meeting.


The Branch Executive Committee will assist Branch Members so that they can make an orderly and an expeditious exit (i.e. ensure that they do not stop at the badge return trays) and verify that each zone is clear.

Branch Members exiting the building are requested to make their way to an Assembly Area located by the entrance to the Police Firing Range at the far end of the Upper Car Park. Branch Members Sponsoring Guests are responsible for their Guests at all times. A role call will be made by name and/or member number by the Assistant Secretary. The Check in Rosters will be provided by the Treasurer and used for the roll call. Any unaccounted for members and guests, and members needing medical attention will be immediately reported to the Rescue Authorities when they arrive.

Branch Members who have medical or first aid experience and wish to offer their services should make themselves known to the Assistant Secretary during the roll call.

Branch members are requested to remain in the Assembly Area until the Rescue Authorities declare the area safe for individuals to leave the area. Please do not attempt to drive your car before being told it is safe to leave the area.

FISHING REPORT PAUL DUBOW



Trout fishing was the hot topic this month. Every trip resulted in limits. George Schulze and Carl Moyer caught their limits at Shadow Cliffs Reservoir. Carl scored more limits, fishing the shore at San Pablo Reservoir on four occasions, with rainbows up to three pounds. John O'Brien and Gordon Linebaugh joined Carl on other days for more limits and some nice sized fish. Pete Gates, Tom Boltz, and Steve Lofton caught their trout in the Feather River near Graeagle and at Lake Davis in Portola. After successfully fishing in a bass tournament at New Melones Reservoir, Bill Landers traveled to Lake Davis where he joined Joe Miscione, Craig Walton, Harry Sherinian, Terry Miller, and Paul Dubow for two days of trout fishing, all catching limits each day with the largest fish measuring in at 21 inches.

Trout fishing was not the only dish on our menus. Paul Dubow made his annual trip to his old haunts in northern Wisconsin and caught and released approximately 40 bass and 10 walleyes in three days. Pete Gates, Joe Miscione, Jack Waddell, Karl Droese, and Paul Dubow traveled to Lake Oroville and in three hours caught their limit of 25 Coho salmon. However, salmon fishing in the ocean was a non-event because of heavy winds. The wind also negatively affected fishing in the bay. But the wind did not deter John O'Brien from venturing out into the bay seeking halibut and stripers. However, he only landed some small sharks.

We will be very busy this summer. We have scheduled various trips for kokanee in Lake Berryessa, trout in local lakes, delta fishing for black bass and, assuming that the wind dies down, salmon trips in the ocean and delta fishing for sturgeon and stripers.
