I PLEDGE ALLEGIANCE TO THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA AND TO THE REPUBLIC FOR WHICH IT STANDS, ONE NATION UNDER GOD, INDIVISIBLE, WITH LIBERTY AND JUSTICE FOR ALL.

One of the impressive characteristics about our Branch 146 members is our patriotism. Many of our members have proudly served in the armed services. As Big Sir I lead our Pledge of Allegiance each month, and to hear our members recite this one sentence is inspiring!

The Pledge of Allegiance was written in 1892 by the socialist minister Francis Bellamy. It was originally published in *The Youth's Companion* in 1892. He had hoped that the pledge would be used by citizens in any country. In 1923, the words, "the Flag of the United States of America" were added. In 1954, in response to the Communist threat of the times, President Eisenhower encouraged Congress to add the words "under God," creating the 31-word pledge we say today. According to our 'Code', the Pledge should be rendered by standing at attention facing the flag with the right hand over the heart.

In order to feel pride as an American, and know that freedom does not come easy, we need to remember that we have a responsibility to ourselves and our country to be sure liberty and justice for all is more than something mumbled each month.

I encourage you to think about what you are saying in this pledge. The real bottom line for you should continue to strengthen your personal pride in being an American and valuing your freedom! Have a safe and meaningful Fourth of July!

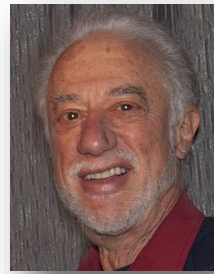
Book Group

The SIR Book Group met on June 10th at the Greenery Restaurant to discuss *The Path Between the Seas: The Creation of Panama* by David McCullough. We all thought this would be a thorough accounting of the brilliant engineering that resulted in the incredible Panama Canal project. There was some of that, but most of the book focused on the many characters who were the forces behind pushing the canal project forward.

The first major character was Frenchman Ferdinand de Lesseps. Who has ever heard of him? Apparently, all 19th century France knew de Lesseps as one of the saviors of the Suez Canal project. He would later focus his project development talents on the Panama Canal project. Eventually, without significant technical study, de Lesseps convinced the French investing world that the Panama project was a sound investment and a great opportunity to show the world again France's ability to manage mega projects. But the French project failed due to the vast amount of earth to be removed, uncontrolled yellow fever and malaria, and leaders who did not know what they were doing.

After the French, the Americans took the lead when President Theodore Roosevelt decided that the Panama Canal was a strategic must for the United States. McCullough then went on to detail all the movers and shakers in government and finance who helped bring the project to its glorious completion. For history enthusiasts this is a long but good read. None of us have finished the book yet.

For our next book we chose *The Maltese Falcon* by Dashiell Hammett. This is a short book, but we needed time to finish the McCullough book. Our next discussion will be at the Greenery Restaurant on July 15th at 8:30 am.

Happy summer, fellow Sirs! We are now in the dog days of this warm season and your Dining Out hosts thought it would be appropriate to pick a barbecue restaurant for our July Dining Out experience. After checking out about five in the area, we've decided on **LUCILLE'S SMOKEHOUSE BAR-B-QUE**. While it is a chain, they've nailed the southern style of this specialty with a low and slow approach to cooking the meats. While several of the other restaurants of this genre are good as well, not all can accommodate a large group. This place is located on the northwest side of Sun Valley Mall in Concord and has the seating capacity for about 50 of us. We have negotiated a full menu, to include a shared appetizer of southern chicken strips with a honey mustard sauce, then a Caesar salad, followed by a choice of five entrees. We have included their signature baby back ribs (a half rack), a slow smoked BBQed tri tip, southern fried chicken, grilled salmon, and a spicy jambalaya. All of them are generous servings with appropriate accompaniments. For dessert we have selected their "best ever" chocolate cake. In short, this is not your light dinner and you might want to skip lunch to prepare for this feast. The cost for this dinner is \$45 per person for four of the entrees, with a \$5 surcharge for the baby back ribs.

We have sent out the notice to our email list – and the reservations are coming in fast. You will want to send me an email to reserve your spot quickly, and follow up with a check made out to BR 146, and indicate your choice of entrée.

The date for the event is Monday, July 29th, with our social cocktail hour starting around 5:30 pm, with dinner at 6:15. The parking is plentiful at Sun Valley mall. See you at this summer event!

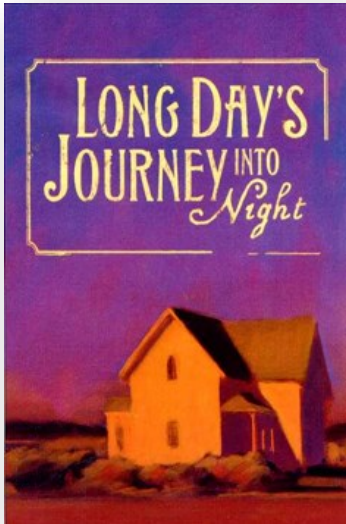

Long Day's Journey is a memorable play about the playwright's family when he was growing up in New London, Connecticut. AREA 16 Fishing Report

This has been a monster month, both in the size of the fish and the size of the catch. Our biggest fish was a 30 lb. salmon caught by **Bob Fieber**, which also won him the party boat pool that day. But the real monster was a 29 lb. catfish that **Ron Lew** of Branch 146 reeled in at San Pablo Reservoir. He and **Carl Moyer** had planned to fish for salmon in the ocean but it was too windy and so they repaired to San Pablo. Later, **Ron** also caught a 10 lb. catfish, which is normally a big fish at the reservoir. The windy ocean also proved beneficial to **Carl Moyer** on another occasion. He signed up for a salmon outing on the good ship Sundance, but *Captain R.J. Waldron* cancelled the trip because of the wind. But the captain invited **Carl** to join him on a halibut expedition in the Bay. **Carl** brought along **Bob Stein** and the trio landed over 40 halibut, releasing most of them.

On another day the wind died down and the Sundance was able to get out into the ocean with fishermen **Brion Beetz** of Branch 146, **Carl Moyer**, **Bob Stein**, and **Jack Waddell**. They came up two short of the limit. But the fish were big, ranging from 12 to 21 lbs. **Mario Moratorio** joined **Carl** on another trip in **Carl's** boat and they caught a dozen halibut, but none were keepers.

In other venues, **Pete Gates** and **Paul Dubow** of Branch 146, along with **Jack Waddell** and **Phil Scimonelli**, traveled to New Melones Reservoir and came home with 18 kokanee. A trip to **Lake Oroville** by **Karl Droese**, **Paul Dubow**, **Ken Konzak**, **Gordon Linebaugh**, **Barry Rauchle**, and **Jack Waddell** was not as rewarding. They caught only seven king salmon, but it was a beautiful day. **Bob Stein**, **Brion Beetz**, and **Carl Moyer** caught rockfish in the ocean. **Dick Thomson**, **Ray Pixton**, and **Chuck Vanoncini** fly fished the lower Sacramento for trout. **Tom Kostik** and **Mike Corker** continued their successful forays for black bass and stripers in the Delta. **Ernie Wong** and **Don Mittlestadt** caught and released a large amount of shad, fishing in the Sacramento and Yuba Rivers.

We are looking forward to an exciting summer. In addition to regular trips in the ocean for salmon, ling cod, and rockfish and in the Delta for sturgeon, stripers, and black bass, we have plans to fish in Lake Berryessa, Collins Lake, Lake Almanor, Lake Tahoe, and Pyramid Lake. We would love to have you join us! You can learn all about our outings by coming to our next meeting, which will be on July 22nd at the Legends Bar and Grill, located at the Diablo Creek Golf Course, 4050 Port Chicago Highway in

The house has remained largely unaltered structurally since Muir's time.

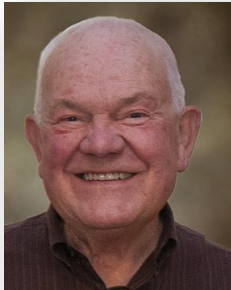

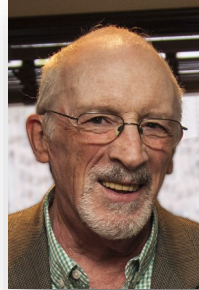
May is a fun time to report on MTD2 because we get the results of the May game night plus the results of the January through May Pot.
