On Friday June 8<sup>th</sup>, we will be hiking the Bear Creek Trail along Briones Reservoir. This will be approximately 4.5 miles long and fairly easy. It is a pleasant hike on EBMUD land and skirts the south and east

shores of Briones Reservoir. We will be hiking all the way to the spillway. Those interested can join us for lunch at the Hofbrau in nearby Orinda.

To reach the staging area from Hwy 24, take the Orinda exit and turn toward Richmond/El Sobrante at the bottom of the ramp. Follow Camino Pablo thru Orinda for a few miles until you will reach a stoplight at Bear Creek Road (on the right). Turn right onto Bear Creek Road and follow it about 1.5 miles to EBMUD's Briones Overlook staging area on the left. We will be carpooling from the Bear Creek Parking area to the beginning of the hike (this is a one way hike back to the overlook staging area).

If you wish to carpool, meet at the turnoff at St Stevens Rd off HI-way 24 at 9:30 am, turn right and park on El Nino Rd where there is plenty of parking. <u>Please let me know if you're coming and also if you would like to carpool.</u>





May could best be described as potpourri month as our anglers caught may different types of fish in many different locations.

Ron Lew of Branch 146, along with Dick Grube, Bob Stein, Carl Moyer, and Stan Wong, tried

their hand at fishing for halibut in the Bay. The future of this fishery is bright since they had to catch five or more fish before they caught one big enough to keep.

Action in the Delta was slow. **Tom Kostik** caught striped and black bass as well as bluegill and there were a few sturgeon caught and released by other members of the group.


Trout fishing in the local reservoirs has subsided, as one might expect this time of year. However, **Brion Beetz** of Branch 146, with **Phil Scimonelli, Terry Miller,** and **Harry Sherinian** ventured out and landed a few rainbow.

Brion Beetz joined Carl Moyer and Stan Wong on a rockfishing jaunt on the ocean and brought home enough for a few dinners. And while we are on the subject of dining, Carl Moyer hosted his semi-annual fish fry where the thirty attendees devoured rockfish, potato salad, and green salad and enjoyed smoked salmon hors d'oevres that were supplied by Tom Boltz of Branch 146.

We also did a bit of traveling. A trip to Lake Don Pedro near Yosemite was quite successful. Pete Gates, Tom Boltz, and Paul Dubow of Branch 146, along with Jack Waddell, Dick Thomson, Karl Droese, and Terry Miller caught over 80 rainbows, releasing most of them, along with a few kokanee and one crappie (pronounced "croppy") on a day long excursion. Joe Miscione traveled to Lake El Salto in Mexico and caught a substantial number of large black bass. Ernie Wong and Ken Konzak had slow fly fishing at Pyramid Lake in Nevada but had better luck with shad upriver. Paul Dubow of Branch 146, with Karl Droese and Dick Thomson, flew to Sitka, Alaska, to fish for king salmon. Unfortunately, the salmon bite was slow and they only caught three in three days, one of which was released because it was undersized. But they limited out on halibut, ling cod, and rockfish. The catch included a 43 lb. ling cod that Paul caught and released because it was over the size limit.

#### **Activity Chairs Need Help**

Several of the current activity chairs have been managing and coordinating their activities for many years and some would like

some help. All of the 47 different activities in Branch 146 – whether a **POKER** or **BRIDGE** group, a **COUPLES DINING OUT** semi-monthly event, an evening **THEATRE** outing to a local performance, or the Friday morning **WALKING** group – all are doing well! Members and the Sirs who participate (and sometimes their spouses), are obviously enjoying themselves. But, in some cases, the activity chair may be getting burned out setting up the arrangements and making sure the activity is a success. In other cases, health or family-related issues have come up which make it difficult for the chair to carry on as before.

Similarly, SIR Milt Smith, who took on the TRAVEL chair position a little over a year ago, has come to realize that the chair's responsibilities puts quite a strain on one person; he needs help in managing and coordinating all the different local outings and foreign trips that are made available to the branch. Any member who likes to travel and help select trips and tours would likely be a good fit for helping Milt.

There are likely other activity chairs who would appreciate another branch member stepping in and offering assistance. <u>Please think about the activities that you now participate in --and ask the chair how they are doing and if they could use some help.</u>


# Book Group Chuck Campbell




