We had 53 diners after some late cancellations, mostly due to health issues. We had a wonderful time in this restaurant, which first opened its doors in 1955 and continues to be one of the finest restaurants in the East Bay.

The service was excellent and the entrees were done to perfection. We were able to have five choices chicken piccata, fried prawns, fresh Pacific salmon, London Broil and the favorite of most of the group - a 9 oz prime rib, which is one the restaurant's signature dishes. For dessert we enjoyed a dish of rainbow sherbet - a refreshing conclusion to this fine dining experience. The cost for the meal was only $\$ 36$, with a slightly higher cost of $\$ 42$ for the prime rib. No doubt, we will return to this restaurant at some future time. O'Neill is the only American playwright to be honored with the Nobel Prize for Literature.

Long Day's Journey is a memorable play about the playwright's family when he was growing up in New London, Connecticut. His father, James O'Neill, was a prominent actor; his mother - a former convent girl addicted to morphine after childbirth; and his carousing brother Jamie. All have dreams, ambitions and secrets that impact younger brother Eugene (named 'Edmund' in the play). Long Day's Journey into Night is considered one of America's greatest dramas.

Ten of us, led by Chuck Vanoncini, traveled to Lake Almanor and caught about fifty fish, all nice fat rainbow trout. This three day trip has become a best seller. The resort (Quail Lodge) provides food, lodging, and guides at a very reasonable price. Interest in the trip by our members has been so strong that we are planning another trip in October.

Closer to home, 23 members of our group enjoyed Carl Moyer's semi-annual fish fry. In addition to the rockfish and ling cod supplied by Carl, Bob Stein contributed smoked salmon and Ron Lew of Branch 146 provided smoked skate. Both of these delicacies were created from the member's own recipe.

For some odd reason, the Department of Fish and Wildlife closed the salmon season between May $1^{\text {st }}$ and May $17^{\text {th }}$ ! Some of us used the opportunity to fish for halibut in the Bay. Carl Moyer and Paul Dubow of Branch 146, caught a dozen halibut, releasing eight, while fishing on the Pacific Pearl. Carl's fish was the largest caught on the boat, so he came home with a $\$ 90$ jackpot. Rich Fiscina and Ron Lew of Branch 146, along with Bob Fieber, Gordon Linebaugh, and Ken Bellinder also did well on the halibut trail.

Larry Kaye and Brion Beetz of Branch 146, as well as Carl Moyer and Phil Scimonelli, caught good sized rainbows in San Pablo Reservoir. Mike Corker and Tom Kostik enjoyed striped bass and black bass fishing in the Delta. Ernie Wong and Ken Konzak packed their ladders, drove up to Pyramid Lake in Nevada, climbed the ladders with their fly fishing equipment, and landed lots of cutthroat trout. Bob Fieber and a friend caught some stripers fishing in the Feather River. Carl Moyer and Stan Wong sailed out of Pacifica in Carl's boat and brought home rockfish and ling cod.

In the next few months, we have scheduled outings at Collins Lake, New Hogan Reservoir, Lake Berryessa, Lake Davis, Lake Almanor, Pyramid Lake, and Lake Oroville plus a host of trips fishing for salmon, rockfish, and ling cod in the ocean.
