Recipe of the Month submitted by Marilyn Harvey

Marilvn's Lasagna

2 pounds ground round, 1 large onion chopped. 1 - 12 oz. can tomato paste. 1 - 28 oz. can S&W ready cut peeled tomatoes (diced) 1 cup red wine.

All dried herbs as follows:

1 tsp salt, 2 tsp basil, 1 bay leaf, 1 tsp rosemary, 1 tsp parsley, 1 tsp Italian herbs, 1 clove minced garlic. In a large pan, brown the ground round and onion. Add rest of the ingredients and simmer 15 to 20 minutes. When finished: Add 1 - 8 oz can sliced mushrooms. drained.

Cook 12 oz lasagna per directions.

Sour cream mixture:

1 pint sour cream, 1 pint cottage cheese.

Season with Lawry's seasoned salt, and pepper to taste. Cook 2 packages frozen leaf spinach slightly - drain. 6 oz sliced Mozzarella cheese, 6 oz grated Romano cheese. Butter 10x15x2" pan. Put in a small amount of meat sauce to cover bottom. Layer lasagna, sour cream mixture, slightly cooked spinach, mozzarella and sprinkle with Romano. Repeat layering of ingredients and finish with the meat sauce on top. Bake at 350 degrees for at least 1 hour. Serves 10 to 12 easily.

Health Matters Physical and Mental

The following articles were copied with permission from the *Aviation Medical Bulletin* published by Harvey W. Watt & Co.

DON'T COUGH UP THE MONEY

Cough syrups are plentiful and make pharmaceutical companies tons of money, but are they worth the price? According to a British Medical Journal (Feb. 9, 2002) report they may not be.

In a review of 15 clinical trials of various types of OTC cough medications including suppressants and expectorants which supposedly reduce chest-clogging phlegm, 9 of the 15 studies found no difference between the medication and a placebo, and the other 6 were of "questionable clinical relevance."

What to do? Fluids, hot tea with honey and lemon, and plenty of rest. That appears to be as good as anything else.

NEW TOOTHBRUSH AFTER 3 MONTHS

Researchers at Oral-B Laboratories have found that toothbrushes lose some of their effectiveness after 3 months of use. New brushes remove much more plaque than older ones. New brushes also appear to be better for gum health. People who used new brushes had significantly less gingivitis (inflammation of the gums) than those using older ones.

THE ALCOHOL FACTOR

The data on light-to-moderate alcohol consumption shows that such can have healthful benefits. It appears that alcohol is good for the blood vessels that supply the heart and brain.

A study reported in Lancet (January 26, 2001), shows that light-to-moderate alcohol consumption (1 to 3 drinks a day) cut the risk of developing dementia in people 55 and over by about 40%.

Lab studies show that alcohol raised the levels of HDL "good" cholesterol, which has a protective effect against heart disease and strokes.

Some have suggested that wine is better (sometimes referred to as the French paradox because the French eat a lot of high-fat foods, but don't appear to be harmed by it as they drink wine as well). Harvard researchers, however, say that it is the alcohol, itself, not the form it comes in.

The key is moderation. Drinking too much is dangerous practice, undoing the good that comes from light-to-moderate consumption.

What is a standard drink? 5 ounces of wine; 1.5 ounces of 80-proof liquor; 12 ounces of beer.

Know Your SIR Bruce Jones

My name is **Raymond Bruce Jones** and I have always been called by my middle name, **Bruce**. I was born in Modesto,

California on My father was salesman and to Sacramento and then on to I started The family Modesto when I grade because **Stanley** had sea breeze at



March 10, 1924. an insurance moved the family for a few years Santa Cruz where grammar school. moved back to was in the 5th my brother asthma and the Santa Cruz made

it worse. I continued school in Modesto through Modesto Junior College. One summer I worked as an assistant electrician at Pollock Shipyard in Stockton and because of the war used "C" gas ration coupons to drive myself and three others to work from Modesto to Stockton. While attending MJC I discovered that I was good at math and with my electrician experience I decided to pursue electrical engineering in college.

During my studies at UC Berkeley I was called in for a physical by the draft board which I flunked. I had a hernia and was classified 4F which allowed me to continue my studies at Berkeley. While at Berkeley I earned my meals by mopping the kitchen floor in Stern Hall (girls' dorm) every evening. After graduating with a BS in electrical engineering at the end of the war in '45 I had job interviews with Westinghouse (starting wage for engineers was 90 cents per hour) and General Electric (starting wage of \$1.00 per hour). As you might have guessed, I went with General Electric and was assigned to the GE test program starting at Fort Wayne Indiana. It was my first trip out of the State of California and in those days a new employee had to pay his own way to the first assignment and pass a pre-work physical before getting on the payroll.

Soon after arriving in Schenectady I saved up enough money to have an operation to correct the hernia. The draft board immediately gave me a 1A rating. However by this time I was working on converting the B29 gun fire system from 27 volts DC to a 3 phase 400 cycle power system for the B36 Bomber and GE requested and received an occupational deferment from the draft board.

I met my wife, **Liz**, in 1953 and we got married in 1954 at the Congregational Church in Berkeley. We have two children, **Larry** and **Nancy** and three grandchildren:**Elizabeth, Whitney** and **Savannah**.

During my electrical engineering career I only worked for two companies: GE for 24 years and Bechtel for 19 years. During my years with GE I had many engineering titles including test design, sales, development, field, application and automation application engineer. I was in the San Francisco office from 1950 until 1964 and then in West Lynn, Mass. for 2 years and finally in Cleveland, Ohio for 3 years.

In 1969 I joined Bechtel Power in San Francisco and moved my family back to California. We still live in the same house in Walnut Creek that we bought in 1969. Most of my work with Bechtel involved nuclear power plant design, with redundant control features and evolving design changes to keep up with Nuclear Regulatory (NRC) changing requirements. I had several positions with Bechtel including electrical supervisor, assistant project engineer and manager of project information services. The nuclear power plants that I was mostly involved with were located in Arkansas, New Jersey, Florida and Tennessee. For the Florida assignment in 1986, I spent a full year at Turkey Point (30 miles South of Miami) and my wife and I took turns flying across the country for our monthly visits. I retired in 1988 and have been so busy since then that I don't know how I ever had time to work.

My hobbies include photography, cooking, gardening, Elderhostel travels, computers, and bowling. I also walk a lot so that I don't have to take medicine for diabetes. I enjoy the SIR lunches, fellowship, bowling and other get-togethers.

Practice is held at the WC Presbyterian Church normally at 3:00 pm Wednesday. Dates to be commensurate with Song Sir entertainment requirements.




