## SIR 146 Hiking

On Friday, March $10^{\text {th }}$, we will be hiking Round Valley Regional Preserve. This hike is a moderate three-creek, 5 mile tour through rolling hills of oak woods and grassland. There will be about a 1000 ft . elevation gain and on a scale from 1 to 10, I would say it's a 7or 8 (my SIR rating). Round Valley is a protected habitat for the San Joaquin kit fox, and golden-eagle sightings are frequent. The wildlife-viewing is exceptional throughout this hike. I like to do the hike this time of the year because in the summer it is too hot and, Marsh Creek will have plenty of water in it. We will be having our lunch at the highest point about half way through our hike, which will include beautiful views of the Delta and beyond.

Directions: Round Valley is about 12 miles past Clayton on Marsh Creek road (past Morgan Territory Rd.). Anybody wishing to carpool can meet at the Clayton Library parking lot at 9:15 am. Meet at the Round Valley parking lot at 10:00 am.

By the way, they don't throw parties on party boats. We have lots of plans for trout, sturgeon, and striper fishing in the coming months. We almost had to move the meeting to my house when we could not get the door open to the meeting room but the cleaning crew showed up and they were able to get the door opened with a little help from WD-40.

Roy Hodgkinson and I showed various pictures taken from our respective Sony alpha cameras, 6000 and 6500 models. My picture of the street where I live using only the lone street light behind me is shown below. The picture was hand-held with a shutter speed of $1 / 10 \mathrm{sec}$, ISO set at 25,600 , and the lens f-stop of 3.5 . The Sony alpha cameras are noted for their ultra low light capability as the picture below shows little noise and good color saturation.


Our next meeting will be held on April $28^{\text {th }}$ when we will show and review pictures taken from a field trip yet to be scheduled a week or so before the meeting. We will have information about the field trip in next month's Photography column. We hope you will join us.

After considering our options, we have decided to go to Zio Fraedo's on Gregory Lane in Pleasant Hill. This place has a long-standing reputation as an excellent restaurant that serves Continental and Italian cuisine and caters to larger parties. Many of you have recommended that we try this restaurant for our Couples Dining Out and we have gotten an excellent menu and price. We will have a single evening on Monday, March $20^{\text {th }}$ and will be able to accommodate a larger number than we could for other restaurants. Ten members of the SIR Book Group met Monday morning Feb $13{ }^{\text {th }}$ to discuss Cormac McCarthy's book Blood Meridian. The story takes place in the mid 1800's starting in Texas. Initially a group of drifters, including a 14 year old kid, are recruited by a self-proclaimed Captain who wants to wage war on Mexicans and claim more lands for Texas. This group is shortly attacked and beaten by a group of Apaches. The remnants of the raiding party are subsequently put into service with a new group of mercenaries under the charge of a man named Glanton. The purpose of the new group is to rid the northern part of Mexico of the Apache warriors and they are to be paid by the number of Apache scalps brought to the local governors. The last character of note to be introduced is a man called Judge. He is a big strange man (maybe mystical) in command of all sorts of knowledge that he can employ to get this group of mercenaries out of trouble.

What follows are bloody raids by the mercenaries which are initially praised by the local governments. However, later raids also kill Mexican villagers resulting in Glanton's group being chased by Mexican soldiers. The story continues with more evil and bloody events which take place along the Texas-Mexican border. The relationship between the Judge and the kid becomes a strange focus as the story evolves.

We all agreed that McCarthy is a very talented writer particularly his descriptions of landscape settings. We also agreed that this book is not for the casual reader. Some felt that the unprovoked violence and depravity left the reader wondering what the author was trying to say.

Our next book is the classic For Whom the Bell Tolls by Ernest Hemingway. We will meet Monday, March $13^{\text {th }}$ at the Black Bear restaurant at 8:30 am.
