

The Branch Honoree Award is the highest honor the Branch awards its members. The Honoree Award was established in 1999 to recognize active members who have made outstanding and continuing contributions to the success of Branch 146 over a period of years.

The Honorees Committee administers this Award and recommends candidates to the Branch Executive Committee for approval. Worthy candidates for this award are identified by their cumulative "Leadership Points", which are associated with each branch leadership position in relation to the position's complexity and breadth of influence.

Members earn points annually with each leadership position they hold. A minimum of 45 "Leadership Points" is required to become eligible for this award. The Honoree Committee may recommend any number of awards in any year.

Couples Dining Out Bruce Borgman

As advertised, we will have our March Couples Dining Out event on March 23rd, with our cocktail hour at 5:30 and dinner at 6:15. I am pleased to let you know that we have selected Burma Unique, located at

1375 N. Broadway in Walnut Creek, on the site of the old Le Cheval restaurant where we dined a few times.

You will remember that we dined at Aung MayLika, a Burmese restaurant in Concord, last year — and it was one of our most successful events ever, with 78 diners on two separate evenings. Burma Unique is one notch up from that experience with dishes that include blending the cuisine from some of the over 135 ethnic groups in Burma as well as importing with some of the neighboring countries' cuisine. Because the restaurant presents these dishes in family style with plates that are shared at a table, the cost of dining is considerably less and we were able to get an all inclusive price of only \$30 per person.

But, this does not mean we've skimped on the variety of dishes that we have selected. We will start with an appetizer of Chicken Lettuce wraps and follow that with the uniquely Burmese Tea Leaf Salad. For entrée dishes we will have a Sesame Chicken, Lemongrass Pork, Honey Walnut Shrimp, and Country Style Beef Curry, along with String Beans. These are accompanied by Garlic Noodles and Jasmine, and Coconut Rice. For dessert, you may select mango, or coconut ice cream.

We have visited this restaurant twice in the last month or two, tried most of the above dishes — and have been pleased with all of them. We will take over the front section of the restaurant, which will seat about 60 diners. I expect that we will quickly reach that number since the cost is about half of our last few dining experiences. Send a quick email to me to secure your spot and follow it with a check made out to Branch 146. The restaurant has a full bar, with reasonable prices for wine and beer — or you may choose to bring your own bottle for a \$20 corkage charge. Parking is convenient at either the garage across the street on N. Broadway, or down the street on Duncan.





SIR 146 Hiking Mark Curtis


We will be hiking the Falls Loop trail in Mt Diablo State Park on Friday, March 13th, at 9:30 am. The earlier start is due to the fact that this hike takes longer; probably 4.5 hours.

We will meet near **Rich Ahlf's** residence at the corner of Weatherly & El Molino in Clayton, 63 El Molino. Parking along Regency Dr is problematic due to local residents' complaints about excessive numbers of people as well as visitors' cars blocking driveways!

This hike is moderate to difficult with about 1,150 feet cumulative elevation gain and about 6.5 miles. Rich and I did this hike about a month ago with 4 hours moving time and 5 hours total.

From Oak Grove/Ygnacio road take Clayton (or March Creek) Road east just past Diablo View Middle School and turn right on Regency. Then take the 1st right on Weatherly, go 2 blocks to El Molino. Then park on either Weatherly or El Molino. It's about 2 blocks from Rich's house to the trail head.





Explore & Eat Black Diamond Mine Tour May 18th 10:00 in Antioch



These mining operations were a colorful past history and an integral part of California's economic development after the Gold Rush and was instrumental in California's economic growth in the mid to late 1800's.



Coal Mining: From the 1860s through the turn of the last century, five coal mining towns thrived in the Black Diamond area: Nortonville, Somerville, Stewartville, West Hartley, and Judsonville. As the location of California's largest coal mining operation, nearly four million tons of coal ("black diamonds") were removed from the earth. The residents of the mining towns were from all over the world, and their life was characterized by hard work and long hours. Occasional celebrations and a variety of organizations and social activities served to alleviate the drudgery of daily existence.

Sand Mining: In the 1920s underground mining for sand began near the deserted Nortonville and Somerville townsites. The Somerville mine supplied sand used in glass making by the Hazel-Atlas Glass Company in Oakland, while the Nortonville mine supplied the Columbia Steel Works with foundry (casting) sand. Competition from Belgian glass and the closing of the steel foundry ended the sand mining by 1949. Altogether, more than 1.8 million tons of sand had been mined.

This an outstanding opportunity to comfortably enjoy a walking tour of a mine in safe, well-lighted environment. Tour participants take a 1309-foot walk into the mine to see mine workings, ore chutes, the shifter's office, and ancient geological features. 


