

The big event this month was an excursion led by Ernie Wong to Pyramid Lake for cutthroat trout. Rich Fiscina, Pete Gates, Tom Boltz, and Chuck Cornell of Branch 146 all attended along with Harry Sherinian, Pedro Contreras, Ben

LaSala, and **Steve Paulick.** The group fished from ladders placed just off the shore and were very successful. The expedition was topped off by dinners at **Pedro's** vacation home near the lake.

We also held our annual fishing gear auction at our last meeting. Our members walked away with some bargain booty and our treasury was nicely augmented so everybody was happy.

Delta fishing this month was good by and large. Karl Droese and Dick Thomson fished with a guide for stripers and caught limits up to 13 lbs. Mike Corker, Terry Miller, Harry Sherinian, Carl Moyer, and Tom Kostik fished for stripers with mixed success but, on one of the outings, Carl landed a keeper sturgeon. Tom Boltz and Rich Fiscina had a terrific sturgeon outing, with both landing keeper sturgeons. But Pete Gates and Pedro Contreras only picked up shaker sturgeon while fishing with Rich and Tom one week later.

On the trout front, Jeff Sturm, Stan Wong, Mike Corker, Reggie Fromm of Branch 146, George Vogt, Gordon Linebaugh, and Carl Moyer worked San Pablo Reservoir with scattered results. George and Carl limited out, but other attempts resulted in from one to four fish per venture. Shadow Cliffs Reservoir was even less productive, when two visits by George Schulze, Lee Clark of Branch 146, and Carl Moyer led to the boating of a single trout.

We have quite a few outings planned in the next few months. In addition to our regular visits to San Pablo Reservoir, Shadow Cliffs Reservoir, and the Delta, we have scheduled trout trips to Lake Almanor, Lake Davis, and Collins Lake, a striper excursion to New Hogan Reservoir, and a number of forays on the ocean seeking salmon and rockfish.

Our next meeting will be on Thursday, May 26th at the Legend Sports Bar and Grill at the Diablo Creek Golf Course, 4050 Port Chicago Highway, Concord. The meeting begins at 8:30 am but breakfast is available at 7:30. Huckleberry Botanic Regional Preserve

On May 13th, 2016 we will be hiking Huckleberry Botanic Regional Preserve. This is an easy 3 mile hike on a single track trail through the deep redwoods. This small preserve sits on an unusual

deposit of shale and chert - "poor soil" that's well suited to native plants. Huckleberry is a little oasis of manzanita gorgeous woodland of madrone, California bay, ferns, coast live oak, hazelnut, and currant. This is like hiking in an arboretum.

Directions: take Exit 7A onto Fish Ranch Road, the first post-Tunnel Exit- stay in the right lane. Drive north on Fish Ranch Road about 1 mile, then turn left onto Grizzly Peak Boulevard. Drive 2.4 miles, then turn left onto Skyline Boulevard, Drive 0.6 mile on Skyline, then turn left into the preserve parking lot.

Briones Regional Park

Our next hike will be at Briones Regional Park on Friday May 20, 2016. We will meet at the Bear Creek Staging Area at 10am. This will be a 6 mile hike on the Old Briones Road, Briones Crest and Abrigo Valley trails.

We will visit the Sindicich Lagoons and then stop for lunch or a snack at Wi-Ta-Chi group camp. There are some moderate uphill's and downhill's involved, so you might find hiking poles useful. I give this a 7 SIR rating as it's about 6 miles long and only a 400ft elevation gain. Dogs are allowed on this trail.

To reach the staging area from Hwy 24, take the Orinda exit and turn toward Richmond/El Sobrante at the bottom of the ramp onto Camino Pablo. Follow Camino Pablo thru Orinda for a few miles and you will reach a stoplight at Bear Creek Road (on the right). Turn right onto Bear Creek Road and follow it about 4 miles to the entrance on your right. Turn left at the (unmanned) entrance kiosk into the lower parking lot. Make sure you're at East Bay Regional Park, not at East Bay Mud.

If you wish to carpool meet at the turnoff at St Stevens Rd off Hwy 24 at 9:30 am, turn right and park on El Nino Rd where there is plenty of parking.



GOODBYE HILTON:
Attendance at the April luncheon was by far the lowest of any of our four luncheons held at the Hilton this year—down by 24 from the January luncheon and seven less than

our April 2015 luncheon also held at the Hilton. Only 64% of our members were in attendance. That is the lowest percentage of any of our regular luncheons held during the past 16 months.

There were 74 timely notifiers for this luncheon so I was expecting a smaller than usual number of "no shows". That was the most timely notifiers we've had for any luncheon during my tenure in this office—a period of 16 months. It didn't turn out that way however, as we had 27 no shows, the most at any luncheon during that period. Because of that unexpected high number of no shows we had to pay for eight more meals than we consumed. I had guaranteed payment for 195 meals; we consumed only 187, 180 by members and 7 by nonmembers. However, I expect that reimbursements from no shows will more than cover the costs of those eight meals.

I am happy to report that almost all of the comments I've received from members about the April meal were positive. I enjoyed working with the catering staff at the Concord Hilton. I think they tried really hard to make our luncheons a success. I will miss the Hilton's sound system and **Dick Brooks**, our friend from Branch 8, who volunteered his services and expertise in making that system work to perfection.







The playwright died in 2005.




