Our next Hike will be on Friday May $12^{\text {th }}$ and it will be led by Gene Schulting. This hike takes around $31 / 2$ hours covering slightly more than 5 miles and has around a 1,200 ft elevation gain. Trail starts at parking lot on Mitchell Canyon maintenance road and goes to Red Rd. then Black Point Trail (peak is 1,791') back to Mitchell Canyon Rd and to the parking lot. This hike is less used by the public; hence, is a little less maintained so long pants is recommended to minimize effects of being slapped by vegetation. There will be a couple of lunch options midway through the hike. You may want to bring your binoculars to get a good view of your home and surrounding areas with vistas ranging from Pleasanton to Antioch.

Parking is at end of Mitchell Canyon Rd complete ticket and pay $\$ 6$ less $\$ 1 \mathrm{Sr}$. discount. I will be at the Clayton Library parking lot if anybody would like to car pool.

## Fishing Report

In last month's fishing report, we expressed the hope that fishing would improve once spring arrived and it has. Ernie Wong and Don Mittelstaedt caught some good sized cutthroat trout fly fishing from ladders at Pyramid Lake in Nevada. Terry Miller, Harry Sherinian, and Carl Moyer caught rainbow trout fishing between rainstorms at San Pablo Reservoir. Joe Miscione, fishing with his son, caught seven rainbows in Bass Lake. Sal Costanza of Branch 146 landed some nice stripers in New Hogan Reservoir. Hal Tatro fished in Pardee Reservoir and came home with a limit of trout, with the largest weighing four pounds. Mike Corker had a successful outing fishing for black bass in the Delta.

Sturgeon fishing is still disappointing. Tom Boltz and Rich Fiscina of Branch 146, along with Terry Miller, landed a single undersized sturgeon on one outing. However, Paul Dubow of Branch 146, Mike Corker, and Carl Moyer came up empty handed, insofar as sturgeon were concerned, on other trips. Carl did catch a small keeper striper and a catfish on one trip.

The big question mark is salmon fishing. Salmon currently feeding in the ocean were hatched in California rivers in 2014. But a far smaller amount than usual made it to the ocean that year. The season opened on April $1^{\text {st }}$, but considering the expected low quantity of adult salmon available this year, the Department of Fish and Wildlife suspended salmon fishing in our area from April $30^{\text {th }}$ to May $15^{\text {th }}$ and increased the minimum length requirements. Carl Moyer joined two friends fishing from Moss Landing on opening day and each fisherman caught a salmon. That proved to be unusual, because most of those fishing on opening day were skunked.

We remain optimistic and we are looking forward to a successful spring and summer. We have lots of outings planned. In addition to our regular trips to San Pablo Reservoir and the Delta, we have excursions planned for trout fishing at Lake Almanor, Lake Davis, Collins Lake, Bass Lake, Pinecrest Lake, and Los Vaqueros Reservoir; salmon, ling cod, and rock fishing in the ocean; salmon fishing in the Sacramento River; and striped bass fishing at New Hogan Reservoir. Our next meeting is on Thursday, May $25^{\text {th }}$, at the Legend Sports Bar and Grill at Diablo Creek Golf Course, 4050 Port Chicago Highway in Concord. The meeting starts at 8:30 am, but please join us for breakfast, starting at 7:30 am.

After our successful March with 66 diners enjoying Zio Fraedo's Italian restaurant we are ready for a new experience.

As I mentioned at April's luncheon and in the email to our mailing list, the Couples Dining Out event in May is taking us to a different cuisine. We have arranged to go to Alborz Persian Restaurant at 1829 Mt . Diablo Blvd. in Walnut Creek. This restaurant will bring us a Middle Eastern cuisine with a Mediterranean influence - one which many of you may not have experienced. In order to taste a variety of these dishes, we will enjoy this restaurant in a buffet style which will allow you to have three different appetizers, then the serving table will (magically) change to present us with a salad, and three kabob type meats, marinated in the unique spices of this cuisine along with basmati rice with almonds, raisins, pistachio and saffron. Dessert will be home made baklava, with a scoop of Persian Rosewater ice cream. Coffee and tea is included.
[Late Update: Upon request from AI Twyford, and negotiated with the restaurant, we have added a lamb dish - it will be a sliced marinated leg of lamb. Also added is a dish of mini meatballs with finely crushed walnuts in a pomegranate sauce.] We will enjoy our cocktail hour again at 5:30 pm and you will be able to sit around a fire pit with soft embroidered pillows, or in the bar area, or the dining area - plenty of room to chat with old friends and new. Dinner will be served at $6: 15 \mathrm{pm}$ - did I mention the date? It's Monday May $22^{\text {nd }}$. The total cost for this event will be $\$ 50$ per person. We will have a slightly reduced wine price (\$7), or you can bring your own bottle for a $\$ 15$ corkage fee.

The location for this restaurant is convenient in central Walnut Creek. The parking is somewhat limited to a small lot in front of the restaurant and behind the adjoining building, as well as through the arch to another small lot or on the street. Remember that WC meters run until 8 pm so bring quarters and, as always, car pooling is encouraged. As of this writing we have 45 diners signed up - we can accommodate a bit over 50 - so sign up quickly if you wish to be included in this interesting dining experience. We especially encourage new members this is a great way to meet your fellow Sirs and their spouses. See you there!!

You need a password manager. I would suggest 1 Password. 1Password is a fantastic app that stores and syncs your passwords and other important information across multiple devices. You can store credit cards passports and other information. The information is protected with a password and you can make the information available on your computer, phone and pad.

\section*{Amcrest Video Camera}

At the April luncheon I mentioned the Amcrest video camera. This is a 1080 video camera that you can set up to video a room in your house. It is wireless for the video, however the camera does need a connection to an electric plug. The cheaper camera is for internal use and you can find them on sale on Ebay for about \(\$ 70\). If you install a 64GB micro SD card you can record up to a month of motion. The camera is controlled by your iPhone or Android. They do have an external wireless camera that sells for about \(\$ 100\).

The camera is called Amcrest IP2M-841 ProHD 1080P (1920TVL) Wireless WiFi IP Camera

\section*{LibreOffice}

LibreOffice is a fully functioning office suite for PC or Mac, including spreadsheet, word processing and presentation programs, and the files it produces are in Microsoft Office format. This office suite isn't a webbased system and instead is downloadable and runs offline. It's compatible with Windows, Mac and Linux systems. LibreOffice is a popular product because, although there are a few missing features, you get all the basic office software and some advanced options at no cost.
With LibreOffice, you get the three main programs that you'd expect. These are Writer, which is the word processor; Calc, spreadsheet software; and Impress, the presentation maker. You also get Draw, which is the equivalent of Microsoft's Paint; Base, database software; and Math, an equation formulas editor.

This free office suite is compatible with most major file types, including Microsoft Office. While the vast majority of Word files render perfectly inside LibreOffice Writer, some more complex text documents may render differently. You'll also find that the spreadsheet software from LibreOffice is a little more restrictive than some more expensive office suites' spreadsheets and lacks a few of the advanced options, such as using power pivots and adding graphics to headers or footers. However, these minor compatibility and functionality issues really aren't deal-breakers.
