## Couples Dining Out

 Bruce BorgmanIt again was hard to find a restaurant for our May Couples Dining Out experience after we had such a good price and excellent food for our March event at Aung Maylika.
After visiting several, we have decided to return to a restaurant we visited in 2015 (how time flies!). We will be going back to the Brass Door - a venerable restaurant, which first opened its doors in 1955 and continues to be a favorite spot for an evening out. It is a bit further on 1680 but you will find the trip worthwhile.

The price for a three course meal is very reasonable and we picked four entrees that will be \$36 per person - London Broil, Chicken Picatta, Fresh Pacific Salmon, Deep Fried Jumbo Gulf Prawns. In addition, you may select the Brass Door specialty of a 9 oz Roast Prime Rib of Beef - however, this entrée will have a surcharge of $\$ 6$, and thus be $\$ 42$ for the dinner. Last time we had the prime rib and divided the extra cost over all of the entrees, but we thought we'd try it this way to be more equitable. We will have an ice cream dessert with choice of coffee, tea, or soda.

The Brass Door is a few miles south on 680 - take the Crow Canyon Road exit. Parking is convenient in the lot next to the restaurant. You will be able to get a reasonable glass of wine for about $\$ 7$ to $\$ 8$, and corkage is only $\$ 15$ so you may wish to bring a special bottle from your cellar.

We will be in the West Room which will accommodate upwards of 60 diners, but you'll want to send me an email soon, nevertheless, and confirm with your check made out to Sir 146, and sent to me at 3611 Winchester Place in Walnut Creek, 94598.

We will no doubt have a fun time again - this time altogether on a single evening! See you there!

## Legendary Troubadour Featured at SIR Theater Party on June $\boldsymbol{6}^{\text {th }}$

The life and music of America's greatest troubadour will make for a memorable evening in the theatre, as SIR 146 sponsors Woody Sez on Thursday, June 6 at the Lesher Theater in downtown Walnut Creek in this production by Center REP.

Woody Guthrie greatly enriched America's songbook with such notable footstompers as "This Land Is Your Land," "This Train Is Bound for Glory," and "So Long, It's Been Good to Know You." More than forty songs have been woven into this upbeat evening with messages of love, friendship, freedom and equality.

Featuring David Lutken and Darcie Deauville who devised this musical tribute for New York's Irish Theater, the quartet of performers also includes David Finch and Megan Loomis. Woody Sez was also a hit at the Edinburgh Fringe Festival, and toured throughout Europe, and in China. The New York Times called Woody Sez "exhilarating, brisk and polished." Born in Oklahoma in 1912, Guthrie lived a life of turbulence, often reflected in his songs, but he left us with a greatly enriched memoire and songbook.

All have dreams, ambitions and secrets that impact younger brother Eugene (named 'Edmund' in the play). Long Day's Journey into Night is considered one of America's greatest dramas.
