## Little Sir's Corner Bob Wilkenfeld

### Is the End Near for Branch 146?

A volunteer organization, such as Branch 146, cannot survive without the efforts of its members. We all understand this, but unfortunately, we don't always act on it. Our Branch will be facing a real crisis if one of our members doesn't step up soon. Let me explain...

In November, the members of our Branch will be asked to approve the 2023 Officers who have been selected by our Nominating Committee. (These candidates were announced at the October lunch.) Unfortunately, despite the continued efforts of the Nominating Committee and our Big Sir, we have been unable to secure a candidate for the position of Assistant Secretary. This position is critical to the longevity of our Branch as it is the first position held by future Big Sirs. (Our Assistant Secretary normally progresses to the position of Secretary, then Little Sir and finally to Big Sir over a four-year period.) Without an Assistant Secretary next year, we will not have a Secretary in 2024, a Little Sir in 2025, and a Big Sir in 2026. As a California corporation, the absence of a Big Sir means that in January 2026 we will have to either merge with a SIR Branch who has a Big Sir, or surrender our Charter (i.e., cease to exist.) Sure, this scenario may seem alarmist, but if someone does not step up to serve as Assistant Secretary, with the intent to ultimately serve in the other positions, this is the fate in-store for our Branch.

### Veterans Healthcare When and Where You Need It

In November, we are fortunate to have two members of US Veterans Affairs (VA) coming to speak to us about how the VA is extending access to care beyond the traditional office visit. Vickilynn Kimbro (Facility Telehealth Coordinator) and Laura Crawley (My HealtheVet Coordinator) from VA Northern California Healthcare Systems, will discuss a wide range of new digital technologies available to veterans, including Clinical Telehealth, Remote Patient Monitoring, mobile applications, online Personal Health Records, Crisis Hotline and Health Library.

Our speaker and entertainment for the December lunch are musicians from the California Symphony. In his presentation, award-winning instructor Scott

Foglesong will explore music that accompanies the Winter Solstice. We will celebrate music that has been part of the great faith traditions of the world and explore beloved compositions that embrace the simple joys of winter. They will discuss a wide range of new digital technologies available to veterans, including VA Video Connect, My HealthVet, mobile applications, VEText and VA Health Chat.

## November First and Second.

Día de Muertos or Día de los Muertos, the Day of the Dead, is a holiday traditionally celebrated on November first and second, though other days, such as October 31 or November 6, may be included depending on the locality. It largely originated in Mexico, where it is mostly observed, but also in other places, especially by people of Mexican heritage. Although associated with the Western Christian Allhallowtide observances of All Hallows' Eve, All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day, it has a much less solemn tone and is portrayed as a holiday of joyful celebration rather than mourning. The multi-day holiday involves family and friends gathering to pay respects and to remember friends and family members who have died. These celebrations can take a humorous tone, as celebrants remember funny events and anecdotes about the departed.

Traditions connected with the holiday include honoring the deceased using calaveras (pictured above) and aztec marigold flowers known as cempazúchitl, building home altars called ofrendas with the favorite foods and beverages of the departed, and visiting graves with these items as gifts for the deceased. The celebration is not solely focused on the dead, as it is also common to give gifts to friends such as candy sugar skulls, to share traditional pan de muerto with family and friends, and to write light-hearted and often irreverent verses in the form of mock epitaphs dedicated to living friends and acquaintances, a literary form known as calaveras literarias.

## 146 Hiking

So, we have recently had some memorable hikes. And, oh by the way, attendance has been exceptional. We even had a spouse on the last hike in Diablo Foothills, **Karen Lively**.

However, this Diablo Foothills walk did not go as intended. The plan was to do a loop finishing on an un-marked trail, even though the ALLTRAILS APP showed it. This unmarked trail (traversing the face of the Castle Rock cliffs) in my opinion was more hazardous than our group can handle, so 7 of the 9 returned via the first part of the route. **Ray Martz** and **Gene Schulting** tried it, fortunately successfully, and made it back the parking lot half an hour before the rest of us. I think I have learned that ALLTRAILS shows routes that suitable for the youngsters.

The other memorable hike was in a John Muir Land Trust ([jmlt.org](http://jmlt.org)) park called Fernandez Ranch. **Roger Meyer** recommended this to me; Thanks **Roger**. This was a great place to walk with very well-developed trails; none of which were difficult. I recommend this to anyone who wants to spend a couple of hours in our great bay area trails. The route we took was about 4 miles and about 500 feet of climbing. And 8 people (7 SIR members and 1 guest) attended which was great.

## AREA 16 Fishing Report

It is now sort of a “shoulder season” between the ending of the salmon and halibut seasons and the beginning of our quests for trout and sturgeon. But that does not mean that we have

stopped fishing, because there are lots of stripers, rockfish, and black bass out there.

In the meantime, 25 of us took a food break to spend part of a day at a fish fry at **Carl Moyer’s** home where we enjoyed a luncheon of fried rockfish and ling cod, house salad, potato salad, and brownies. At our fishing meeting on October 27, **Pedro Contreras** and **Brion Beetz** gave a power point presentation of their six day long range trip out of San Diego, where they caught several hundred pounds of bluefin tuna and yellowtail. The bluefin weighed between 80 and 130 pounds. **Steve Paulick** and **Stan Wong** were also on the trip. Although the trip was booked for six days, they only fished for five days because they needed to get to port before Hurricane Kay hit. Because they had made a reservation for fish processing after the scheduled end of the trip, they had to spend the sixth day aboard the boat while it was in port, but that enabled them to enjoy the amenities of San Diego.

**Bob Stein, Mike Corker, Carl Moyer, and Brion Beetz** had a nice day on the ocean, boating a bevy of rockfish and lingcod. A few days later, **Carl** sailed on the *Oakland Angler* and caught two halibut. He also had a bit of a thrill when a fellow angler was unable to haul in the fish on his hook. **Carl** took the rod and landed a 20 lb. halibut.

**Terry Miller** and his son **Steve** fished at San Pablo Reservoir. **Terry** was skunked, but **Steve** caught two good sized rainbows. He had a larger rainbow on his line, but lost the fish when his leader broke. **Phil Scimonelli** and his wife **Roisin**, along with **Carl Moyer**, also fished at San Pablo where they caught four rainbows in the 2-3 lb. range. San Pablo closes on November 14 and will not reopen until Valentine’s Day.

Out on the Delta, **Tom Kostik** caught and released 60 stripers of various sizes and a large number of black bass. **Mike Corker** caught two keeper stripers fishing alone and on another day, he and **Harry Sherinian** boated six stripers, three of which were keepers.

**Chuck Vanoncini** led a group of six fishermen on our

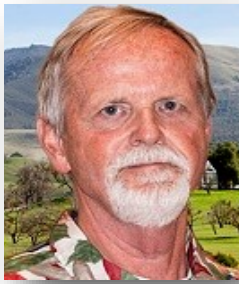
semi-annual trip to Lake Almanor in mid-October. They brought home 25 rainbows over a two-day period and released ten others.

**Paul Dubow, Pete Gates, and Ron Lew** of Branch 146, **Joe Miscione** and his son **Keith**, and **Ken Berry** journeyed to the Sacramento River between Anderson and Corning in the hope of hooking huge salmon. Unfortunately, they ran into the “you should have been here yesterday” syndrome. Fishing had been spectacular in the area right until the day before they arrived, with fishermen bringing home limits before 10 am. Indeed, the river was a virtual parking lot of fishermen who were anticipating a continuation of the good luck. But all good things come to an end, and the end was the day before. Nevertheless, they did land three fish, all over 25 lbs.

All Branch 146 members are welcome to join our fishing outings and attend our monthly meetings. Our next meeting is on Thursday, November 17, at the Legends Bar and Grill at the Diablo Creek golf course at 4050 Port Chicago Highway in Concord. Please note that this is the third Thursday of the month. We normally meet on the fourth Thursday, but the meeting is on the third Thursday in November and December, because of the holidays. The meeting begins at 8:30 am, but many of us gather at 7 am or thereafter for breakfast and/or fishing stories and so please join us at that time. 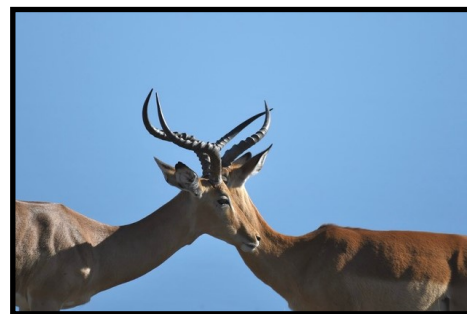

The book chosen for our October meeting discussion was *The Great Railroad Bazaar*, by Paul Theroux. It is the story of his

four-month journey in 1973 through Europe, the Middle East, and Asia. After reaching northern Japan, he traveled by steamer to the far eastern coast of Russia, where he boarded the Trans-Siberian Express to Moscow, and from there to his home in England, where his wife and children awaited him.

Paul Theroux is an 81-year-old American who now lives in the United States. He spent several years in Africa, some of it in the early days of the Peace Corps. He publicly chose the wrong side in a Malawi election in 1963 and had to leave for Uganda. His moves with first wife and children after Uganda included Singapore and London, where they lived for many years. After his first marriage ended, he made the move back to US. He is the author of 10 travel books and 11 novels and has been given many literary awards. He can be quite outspoken on political issues, and critical of public figures.

Paul is what is now called a “traveler,” not a “tourist,” as he spent most of his time on his adventures engaging with the locals, fellow travelers, and the train staffs. He strongly preferred traveling by train, and not by car, ship, or airplane. He did use these a very few times as he crossed the continents.

Do not look for lots of information about trains when reading this book. The “Bazaar” seems to refer the extremely varied people with whom he interacted. These include such people as the train conductors, the porters, and all the others that made the trains successfully transport people. He traveled in all the train classes, First, Second, etc. Each nation had its own rail system and he interacted with people who both used it and ran it.

As Paul was a teacher in England, he was able to arrange his schedule to allow time to give lectures on writing, thus earning money to pay for his food, lodging, and travel. Lots of things we take for granted today had not yet been either invented or used by the general public, such as worldwide credit cards, cell phones, the internet, etc. This necessitated a lot more interpersonal interactions, which is really what the book is about, along with the places he visits.

A short representative sampling of places he went to or through include Paris, Yugoslavia, Italy, Turkey, Iran, the Khyber Pass, Pakistan, Afghanistan, India, Sri Lanka, Burma, Thailand, Singapore, Malaysia, Vietnam (after the Americans had left and the war was winding down), Japan, and Russia. He hated Singapore, Teheran, and Bangkok, had mixed feelings about Tokyo, and liked Peshawar, Pakistan and Kyoto, Japan.

There were lots of descriptions and stories of train stations (some of which he absolutely loved and some of which he despised), local towns he visited, the cultures in the places he visited, and descriptions of the cultures in the many stops he made along the way. He traveled light and bought his tickets as he went along. One strong recommendation if one chooses to use the book: Have Google maps available as he travels along. There are no maps in the book.

There are gaps in the story – it jumps/skips some spots in the route. For example, he is traveling through Sri Lanka toward the capital, Colombo, and all of a sudden, he is back in India. On the other hand, he sometimes fills places he favors with too much detail for most readers.

His travels through Vietnam have him talking about what the Americans left behind, the half American children, the destruction, deteriorating military buildings, and the general post-war conditions. He must be careful, as the war between North and South Vietnam continues, and we know who won.

I thought his travels though India on their trains was one of the most interesting to me, but there were “nuggets” of interest in most of the places he stopped. He would stay most anywhere and eat most anything. Most of the trains in which he traveled were not deluxe by any means.

It was interesting to learn about the places he went in the time setting of 1973. He did not go to China. I think it was quite difficult to get into, let alone travel through China at that time, as the Communists had taken over just a few years earlier in 1949.

He never complained about the trains, the food, the accommodations, etc. He just took it as it came, and he managed to cope.

In some ways this is a history book, as it took place almost 50 years ago, and as we know, the rate of change in the post WWII period has been very rapid, and this is one thing that makes it an attractive read. He does dis-

parage some of the ethnic and national groups. Some of these people live at a very low level.

There is a lot to learn from this book, but it is long and takes some effort. There are some very interesting places he describes very well. We recommend it highly to those of you who have a general interest in how the other half of the world lives. If you do not have such an interest, don't try it.

Our group meets again on Monday, November 21<sup>st</sup>, will read *Cloud Cuckoo Land* or *The Flag, The Cross, and the Station Wagon*.

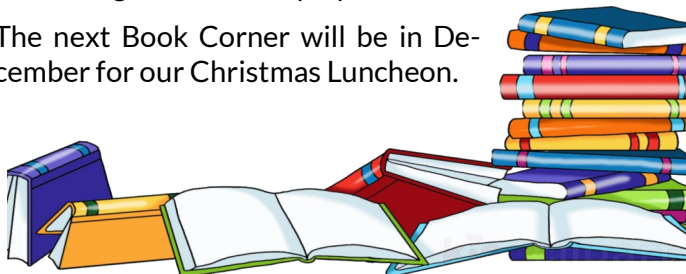

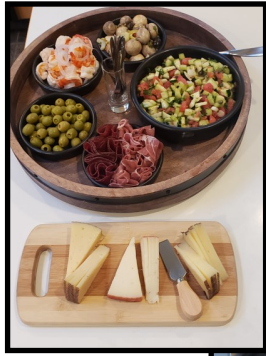

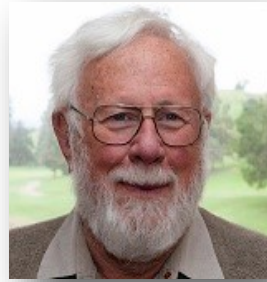
ly, didn't solve the problems of the world.

# Parting Shot

Normally, I keep this last page short and to the point as its name implies it should be.

This month, however will be a bit different and it is much longer, too long to fit on a single page. It is an article that came across to me on the internet as so much does for everyone these days.

And, although I don't consider myself as overly religious, I found it intriguing and interesting and something worthy of sharing because they are talking about men our — my — age. So here you go... **read on!**

When you get to be old farts as we are, you recognize that Jesus never made it to his 70s or 80s.

This guy who is the model for every Christian — What would Jesus do? — spent a lot of his life getting ready for his work. Then came his active ministry of three years.

And then his crucifixion at the age of 33 and his resurrection.

We remember our 30s and all the world-changing energy we had. We know what it's like to go full throttle all day and get by on a few hours' sleep and have endless amounts of ambition to right wrongs.

We can see Jesus walking up and down Galilee and into Samaria and up to Jerusalem. We know how he felt. We can see him joining the disciples to pass around the five loaves and two fishes to feed the multitude. We can see him preaching the Sermon on the Mount.

And we can see him in the temple, knocking over the tables, whipping the moneychangers, and driving out the oxen and sheep sold there for sacrifice.

We can't see ourselves doing that. Not anymore. For one thing, people would just laugh at two old dodderers trying to be heard over the din of that mercantile space. And, for another, some bouncer — hopefully, a kindly bouncer — would simply step in and herd us to the door.

We couldn't physically do it. And, truth be told, we'd have a hard time stoking up enough fire of indignation to carry it off. Over our many decades, we've seen a lot and done a lot and been indignant about a lot. Now, we're kind of tired and a little sad.

What would Jesus do if he were 70 or 80? We're trying to figure that out.

We used to be gladiators in the arena of fighting for what's right, like members of a band of knights on a quest for the holy grail — one of us as a priest and then an attorney, the other as a newspaper reporter. And we still do a little of that.

But, as we said to each other over breakfast the other day at a corner diner, the world has let us know it doesn't need us anymore. Often, each of us feels like an aging dot of flesh clinging to the tiny rock of earth hurtling at dizzying speeds past stars and whole galaxies in an edgeless universe.

In our 30s, we felt our efforts were essential to the betterment of the human race. Now, if one of us is standing on the El train in Chicago, a young woman — pregnant! — will give up her seat for him. (This happened. More than once.)

One thing, we're pretty sure, is that, if Jesus was, say, 75, he'd join us for breakfast. Or for lunch. Or for a weekly golf game. Or for a very slow game of basketball. (If you ever want to feel old, just get into a game with three or four guys in their 30s and watch them fly up and down the court, barely taking a breath.)

We do a lot of these social things because, well, we have the time.

If Jesus had joined us for breakfast, he would have joined us in talking about memory lapses like *Why did I walk into this room?* — and about a close friend who died a couple years ago and about a grandchild and about someone we know who's grieving over the death of a sibling. He would have taken part in our discussion of trying to figure out how to relate to our adult children who, to our great surprise, have lives that don't have us at the center.

And Jesus would have joined with us in bemoaning our aches and pains and health worries and limitations. And he would have had his share. He was human, after all.

Actually, if Jesus had gotten to 75, he'd be doing just about the same sort of stuff we're doing. Like the two of us, he'd be talking regularly with doctors who'd be so much younger that they'd seem like teenagers. And he'd be finding ways to fill his time while the rest of the world went about its busy business.

And he'd be hanging around with and talking on the phone to and going to wakes and funerals for other old farts.

What would Jesus do? He would live the same sort of life that we're living. He would be. Simply be.

Instead of ministering to huge crowds and traipsing long miles on dusty roads, he'd be ministering to guys like us, like him. By simply being there.

He would minister by being Christlike. That is, by really listening to the other old guys who aren't looking for answers so much as they are for someone to hear them. He would be honest about what he was feeling at such an advanced age. If he was troubled in spirit, he'd be honest about it and not try to pretend that everything was hunky-dory. When you get to be our age, nothing's all that hunky-dory.

He would visit the sick, if it wasn't too depressing for him, or too traumatic. He would accept the humility that age had forced on him — unless this was one of those times when he was angry about it.

He would take each moment as the gift it is, and each person, too. And reflect that to everyone around him.

So, that's how we've decided to act. We're going to be like Christ.

Which is to say that we're going to be ourselves, but just better.
