Fall is in the air and our Indian summer is in full swing. The days are warm, the nights cool and we are getting back into our normal routines. Thanks to **John Lewis** we had an article on SIR and a picture of the walking group in the Contra Costa Times and an article



in the Concord Transcript. This is great for both SIR and Branch 146. Keep up the great work. Our Branch now has a full waiting list. Unfortunately we had 26 applications for 13 openings on the list. As many of you know our total State organization has an ongoing membership drive. Our president's theme of "have fun, bring in one" has been working to the extent that our month to month loss has nearly stabilized. Branch 146 is most fortunate to have the opportunity to grow slightly and add to the total number of Sirs. We currently have 211 members and 4 Honorary Life members plus 30 on the waiting list. Normally we get between 180 and 200 attendees at the monthly luncheon meetings. I propose that we increase Branch 146 membership by 19 (9%) up to 230. Its good for our Branch and good for SIR. This would put those who missed the waiting list on it plus add two additional tables to the luncheon room which has ample space. Many of our activities can take more participants. For example we have 80 starting times each Tuesday for golf and normally field 60 to 70 players. One area of concern is the room capacity for Ladies Days in May and December. Based on experience we can certainly add a few more and, if necessary, give priority to Sir's guests, waiting list/guests then fill in with SIR friends as space permits. Your board will discuss increasing the Branch size at the 9:30 am October executive meeting and hopes to get a resolution.

> **Recipe of the Month** Portuguese Beans by Barney Meade

One pound bag of pink beans (Safeway carries these)

1 package Silva Linguisa sausage (2 links)

Cooking

3-8 ounce cans tomato sauce

1 heaping tablespoon chili powder

1 heaping tablespoon ground cinnamon

In order to reduce the enzymes that contribute to the gassiness of the beans, soak the beans overnight in 6 cups of water and 1 tablespoon of baking soda. Drain and rinse the beans and add 6 cups of water. Bring to a boil for 1 minute, let the beans sit for one hour, then drain and rinse again. Add 6 cups of water and simmer for 1 to 1-1/2hours until tender. Drain the water, and add the tomato sauce, spices and linguisa cut into 1/8 to 1/4 inch thick slices. Simmer for one hour, stirring frequently in order to keep the bottom from burning. It may be necessary to add water or broth in small quantities in order to moisten the batch to keep it from sticking to the bottom. For best results, make a day ahead of time and refrigerate to allow the flavors to blend. Heat beans about one hour before serving. As above, add water or broth to moisten. Serve with Trader Joe's corn bread made with buttermilk and whipped egg white. Pour the batter in a hot cast iron skillet and cook in the oven.

Health Matters Physical and Mental

VACCINES?

Vaccines used to be just for kids. As a result, many adults who could benefit from modern-day vaccines don't think about getting the protection they offer.

The Centers for Disease Control offers these suggestions for adults:

Varicella (chicken pox)

Chicken pox can be particularly serious in adults, even resulting in death. Each year, the disease sends 12,000 people to the hospital.

Who needs the vaccine: Persons who have not had chicken pox or have not been already immunized, especially healthcare workers and others at high risk of exposure, such as day-care workers, international travelers, and college students.

Hepatitis **B**

This virus, which affects the liver, leading to cirrhosis and cancer, kills 4,000 to 5,000 persons every year. *Who needs the vaccine:* Anyone at risk for exposure to the virus through contact with infected blood or by sexual contact with an infected person. Those at highest risk include healthcare workers, travelers to areas like Africa and Southeast Asia, where hepatitis B is common, and sex partners of persons known to have the disease.

Measles-Mumps-Rubella

Measles can cause seizures, brain damage, even death. A woman who gets rubella during pregnancy could miscarry or have a baby with serious birth defects. *Who needs the vaccine:* Anyone born after 1956 who hasn't already been immunized, especially women. Those born before that time almost universally have antibodies to these diseases, which were once common childhood infections.

Diphtheria-Tetanus

Diphtheria, a respiratory disease spread by coughing and sneezing, can cause airway obstruction, coma, and even death. Tetanus, brought on by bacteria that enter the body through wounds and cuts, can affect the nervous system causing muscle spasms and rigidity, leading to respiratory paralysis.

In one third of the cases it causes death.


Who should be vaccinated: All adults need booster shots throughout life; anyone who has not had the initial 3 shot series should get it.

This shot reduces flu related hospitalizations and other complications. Vaccinations may not prevent flu entirely, but will ensure a milder case.

Who should be vaccinated: All adults over 50, anyone with chronic heart or lung disease, diabetes, kidney disease or immune disorders, nursing home residents, pregnant women whose 2nd or 3rd trimester coincides with the flu season. Care givers who could transmit the disease to people at high risk.

Pneumonia

Investments

Once easily treated with penicillin, this infection of the lungs has become resistant to antibiotics. Pneumonia is one of the most common vaccine preventable diseases in this country.

Who should be vaccinated: All adults 65 and older, and anyone with long term health problems.




