Our guest speaker for October is Jane Adams who is a Sandhill Crane Docent -- “The Magical Migration Phenomenon of Thousands of Sandhill Cranes into our ‘Backyard’”.

More than 30,000 of these celebrated, 4-foot-tall, slate-gray birds with a bustle of drooping feathers over their rumps and crimson crowns are back in the nearby Central Valley’s Delta and floodplains from Alaska, Oregon and California’s Sierra valleys for better climate and food supply during the colder months.

These Cranes have flown this Pacific Flyway route since before Homo sapiens arrived more than 10,000 years ago, when the Central Valley was a wetland paradise and hosted far greater numbers of the birds than we see today. Our speaker will explain this phenomena and where & when to see these birds.

FRENCH TRAIL

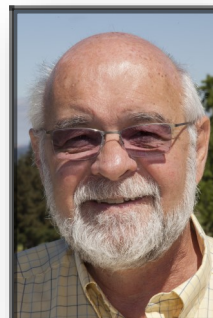
REDWOOD REGIONAL PARK

Please join us Friday October 12th, for a nice cool hike through the redwoods of Oakland. We will be hiking the French Trail loop at Redwood Regional Park. This is a 6 mile single track moderate loop hike that hits all the highlights of this well-shaded park nestled in the Oakland hills. This is a peaceful, hidden bowl of coastal redwoods with a creek at the bottom. Notice this hike is rated as moderate, I am allotting three and a half hours with plenty of breaks and a lunch stop. Hiking poles are recommended as the first section is a steep uphill, after that will be a mostly level hike through the redwoods, also at the same time we will do an easy hike along Redwood Creek on the Bridal Trail (Dogs are allowed), hopefully we will both meet halfway for lunch.

Take Hwy 13 to Redwood Road, turn left and drive about 4 miles to the Redwood Gate and park in the first lot on the left after the Fishway interpretive center. Redwood Regional Park, 7867 Redwood Road.

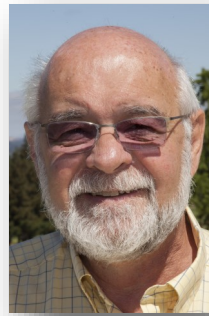

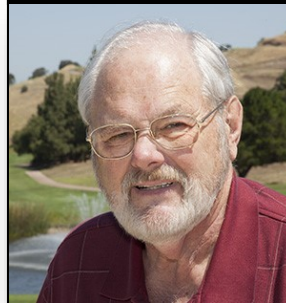
SongSirs

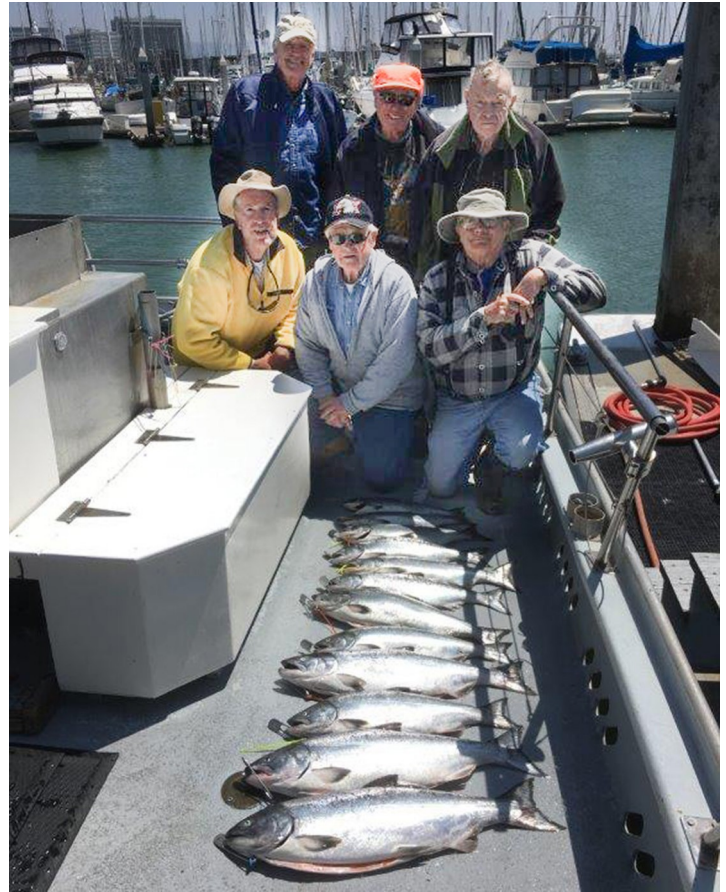
AREA 16 Fishing Report

Book Group

The SIR Book Group met the morning of September. 24th to discuss *Killers of the Flower Moon* by David Grann. The book documents the mysterious history of multiple killings of Osage Indians in Oklahoma during the 1920's, and the subsequent

investigations by a newly-authorized FBI.

We all found the book an easy but interesting read, particularly about how poorly Native Americans were being treated even in the 1920's. The Oklahoma tribes became targets because much of their reservation land was found to have large deposits of oil for which they retained the mineral rights. To gain the oil drilling rights, plots were hatched to kill selected Indians and then obtain the Indian oil rights through marriage with an Osage Indian or other devious methods.

With his newly-authorized authority, J. Edgar Hoover appointed Tom White, an ex-Texas Ranger, to organize and execute investigations into the Indian killings. This White did, but with puzzlingly little help from local authorities. The book also gave some insights into how Hoover started crafting the FBI image. Grann concludes the book by bringing up still more possible crimes, leaving the impression that the early FBI investigations were not thorough enough.

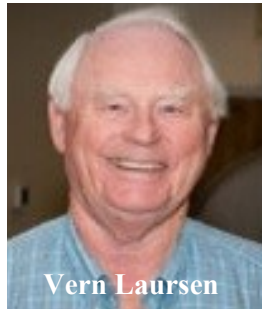

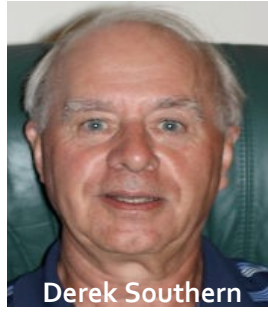
