At 8:30 AM, a group of eight SIR birders including a few photographers from the SIR Photography group met at Heather Farms Park to look for birds in the main pond and the adjacent woodlands. We

ended up spotting 28 species of birds. Highlights of the trip included a pair of Green Herons that flew back and forth across the pond, including one that landed on the lawn about 60 feet from where we were meeting. Other highlights included 4 Black-crowned Night Herons perched on the island, a Great blue Heron, a female Belted Kingfisher, and a pair of Red-shouldered Hawks that flew around the parking lot and perched in a nearby tree as we were entering our cars to go home. Most of the ducks that make the pond their home in the winter had left a few days earlier to fly north to find love and fine dining in northern Canada and Alaska.

Our next field trip is scheduled for 8:00 AM on April 17th in Mitchell Canyon to catch the birds as they migrate north to their spring nesting locations. Mitchell Canyon is on the north slope of Mount Diablo and is famous for being the best migrant bird trap in the county. I regularly see over 50 species on this trip. 

AREA 16 Fishing Report

The Department of Fish and Wildlife finally issued regulations for rockfish fishing in 2024. To our surprise, fishermen will be able to angle for rockfish in depths of less than 300 feet for

most of the year. The season will open on April 1 with fishing allowed in a depth of more than 300 feet. Then in May, only near-shore fishing (less than 200 feet) will be allowed, and that rule will be in effect through September 30. In October, the 300 feet minimum goes back into effect, near-shore fishing will be permitted in November, and December fishing is limited to 300 feet or more. The season will close on December 31.

We have yet to hear from the Department about salmon regulations, but the best guess is that there either will be no salmon fishing or that there will be an extremely short salmon fishing season.

We had two interesting speakers at our February meeting. Alexandria Wampler, a Ph.D. candidate at UC Davis, discussed the salmon rice land project. Rice fields north of Sacramento are normally flooded in the spring. Small entries were built in the berms that surround the field so that juvenile salmon can enter and could grow without their normal predators nearby. The program has been successful to a degree, i.e., a higher amount than the usual number of juveniles have survived. But the survival rate in the Delta and San Pablo Bay is unchanged and this needs to be addressed.

The other speaker was Rochelle Tallman, who discussed the future development of the Klamath River basin, following the removal of four dams on the river.

Turning to fishing results, Shadow Cliffs Reservoir in Pleasanton is producing very well. Many limits and

near limits have been obtained by members of the fishing group, as is illustrated by this picture. San Pablo Reservoir has been a bit slower, but we expect it to pick up. In the Delta, Ron Lew of Branch 146 caught and released four undersized leopard sharks, but the striper fishing, which had been hot earlier in the

year, has tailed off. Halibut are now in the bay. The catch has not been great, but we expect it to improve and have planned four halibut trips on the Sundance in April and May.

Our next meeting is on Thursday, March 28, at the Legends Bar and Grill at Diablo Creek Golf Course, 4050 Port Chicago Highway in Concord. This is also our annual auction where members offer some of their gear for sale at substantially reduced prices. Thus, if any of you are looking to supplement your fishing stuff or are interested in taking up fishing, this would be an excellent opportunity for you to attend. The meeting begins at 8:30 am, but many of us arrive at 7:30 for breakfast and to spin tales. And, if you miss this meeting, the next one will be at the same time and place on April 25.

Book Group John Pearl

The SIR 146 Book Group met in February and discussed our book of the month, Fire Weather, by John Vaillant. It is the story of the immense fire in Alberta in 2016 in and near the town of Fort McMur-

ray. Mr. Vaillant is a resident of Vancouver, BC, and has now written several books, including the nonfiction The Tiger and The Golden Spruce.

However, the author seems to feel strongly that the greedy oil companies and those who drive over-size vehicles are the bad guys. The author compares the words "oil" and "gas" to fire and money, as combustion The book itself can be considered as three books in one. is the universal driver of much of world and economy.

As noted, when the fire nears the industrial area and the town, the first responders do their best to respond, and do make some progress on holding back the flames. The fire fighters learn and improvise as they go. One tactic adopted was to try to save every third house, as The second book is about the industrial side of the area, the speed the fire traveled was such that one at a time was just too slow.

The book is paced with examples of the modern uses of hydrocarbons - they are everywhere. He refers to them as "fire in waiting." 

Niles Essanay Silent Film Museum





The first person to exhibit regular movie shows in Niles was Charles Esselstyne, under the name The Edison Moving Picture Company, in 1912. Called the Edison Theater, it opened on November 4, 1913, with a program of five reels of film and illustrated songs performed by Mr. & Mrs. George Wellington of San Francisco. The theater was licensed by the Motion Picture Patents Company to show films from its members, which included the Essanay Film Manufacturing Company. On April 29th 1914 with a one week old Essanay film, *Broncho Billy Treacherous Pal*, a two-reel Pathe film, *The Frozen Trail*, and a Keystone comedy was a hit production. Essanay personnel, including movie icon Charlie Chaplin, made films with these studios and watched his films in this theater until the Essanay studio closed in 1916.

Well, this is one of those times when my report of the Couples Dining Out experience for March is a mixed bag. You will we had high hopes for a won-

derful dinner at a local Chinese restaurant in Pleasant Hill-Three Brothers from China.

First, the good news - we were anticipating a fine group of 51 diners and had agreed with the restaurant to have six tables of eight or nine diners and just be charged for five tables. This gave us a bit more elbow room. But I received a call the night before from one of our members to ask if he could still come with three additional diners. So, we wound up with a fun group of 54. You will be able to see a few pictures of some of the tables, and it's clear that all of us had a great time.

Our cocktail hour usually starts at 5:30 - but many of our guests arrived early - even before 5pm! The restaurant only charged us \$9 corkage - an unheard-of bargain in these inflationary times. So we had more time to socialize and we decided to start the dinner early - at 6pm.

We had selected their banguet menu 1 which included 10 items for each of our tables. Therein lies my disappointment. A few of the dishes were savory and unique but several of the dishes were not of the quality that we are used to. They seemed to me to be heavy on the sauteed vegetables, tofu, and sauce, with minimal amounts of seafood or beef components. One dish was described as Dungeness Crab with ginger and scallion, but the cracked crab was virtually impossible to get to without implements to extract the crab which were not provided.

One shining dish was the Golden crispy chicken with garlic which had outstanding flavor. Also, the black bass filet was an interesting and tasty dish. Regardless of our disappointment with the cuisine, you will be able to see from the pictures of the event that we had a great time conversing and socializing with our fellow diners. All in all, I felt that the culinary component of this Dining Out experience left something to be desired.

But of course - the great majority of our Dining Out events are everything we expect them to be. So, this single experience which was less than a totally suc-

cessful event is one which we will put behind us and look forward to our next time to get together for another Couple Dining Out event.
