
Little Sir's Corner Jerry Kaplan




Sadly, Branch 146 must say adios to **Rob** and his lovely wife **Carmen** as they will soon join numerous US expats as they

move into their new home in Mazatlán, Mexico. As a heads up, the line to reserve a date as a house guest at **Rob's** place starts right behind me after the meeting ends.



July SIR Branch 146 Award Ceremony Honoring Bob Burley



At July's monthly meeting, we recognize **Bob Burley** for 20 years as a member of branch 146. This follows **Bob** becoming a Senior Sir on his 90th birthday in 2017.

Older people like us often say that during their lifetime, many things have happened and have changed, that they fondly look back on. **Bob** is certainly no exception. He was born in 1927 in a farmhouse east of Lancaster, CA with the aid of a midwife. A few days later, a country doctor came by to collect the family's \$5 to complete a birth certificate. **Bob** stayed in Antelope Valley for 18 years, attending a 4-room grade school with 4 very good teachers through the 8th grade. Then, he had a long bus ride to attend high school 11 miles away that covered a 50 square mile radius.

Growing up, the Great Depression was in full swing with no luxuries. However, his family was better off than in other parts of the country, allowing **Bob** and his siblings to be a happy lot. He relates that there are many games that can be played with little or no equipment.

His high school advisor predicted he would fail; instead, **Bob** graduated with honors and was then accepted at Occidental College. His college career was cut short by the draft. Ready to set sail for fighting in Japan, the atomic bomb was dropped, and Japan surrendered. Instead, he ended up in Korea to be a part of the occupational army. After a year in Korea, **Bob** was discharged, returning to Occidental to earn his degree. He attended dental school at USC.

In 1954 **Bob** passed the Dental Board exams and, most importantly, married **Sally Reynolds**. They moved to Walnut Creek, opened a dental practice, and never left. I am not sure how long they have lived in their home in Walnut Creek, but the word is it is a beauty. When **Bob** and **Sally** moved here, they knew no one, so they joined everything to be-

come Walnut Creekers. This led to **Bob** joining various boards and going through their chairs. This has been rewarding. One of these organizations was our branch 146 which he joined in July 2001.

We know **Bob** was an exceptional dentist, but did you know he was also an exceptional bridge player. Bridge is one of his favorite branch 146 activities and he was consistently in the money.

Bob and **Sally** have 3 children: Brian, Steve, and Cheryl. They live in the Bay Area, and have blessed the **Burley's** with 4 granddaughters and 2 grandsons.






Ross Abbott and Chuck Cornell (members of SIR BRANCH 146) are looking for musicians who enjoy Dixieland music and want to have some fun.

We'll start with Darktown Stutters Ball and see where we go from there. We might even have a beer or wine when it's time for a break.





into the ocean with mixed results.

Our best effort was accomplished by **Carl Moyer, Bob Stein,** and **Brion Beetz,** who with three other fishermen boated ten salmon fishing on the Sundance. But the poundage trophy for the month went to **Duane Einhorn** of Branch 146, who caught two 15 pound salmon on the C Gull II.

Pedro Contreras, joined by **Rich Fiscina** of Branch 146 and **Steve Paulick,** bounced his boat across the Bay and through the Golden Gate, hoping for better conditions in the ocean. It was not to be, and it was a frustrating day. The trio landed a silver salmon, which was released, and a king salmon barely over the 20 inch minimum. On another occasion, **Rich** did not even bother to fish for salmon and instead picked up six rockfish and a 5 lb. lingcod.

Paul Dubow and his son and grandson sailed out of the Bay on the Diamond and encountered the roughest ocean that **Paul** has ever fished on. The boat contained three other fishermen, who had left Fresno at midnight in the hope of bringing home a salmon feed only to come up empty handed and be struck with a bout of seasickness. **Paul** and his group did a little better. **Paul** caught one salmon and his grandson scored with two salmon and a 13 lb. striper. The captain reported that it was the first striper that he had seen in the ocean this year.

Those of us who were smart enough to avoid the ocean and fish elsewhere had far more pleasant outings. **Chuck Cornell** of Branch 146 traveled to Lake Almanor and caught eight rainbow trout over two days, all in excess of five pounds. **Steve Lane** of Branch 146 caught quite a few trout in Sardine Lake. He also tried his hand at fly fishing in the north branch of the Yuba River. 



Recent hikes have been to Del Valle, Point Pinole, and





Four members of the SIR 146 Book Group met Monday, July 26 th , at the Greenery in Walnut Creek. Our first order of business was to welcome our newest member, Mike Rothman, who is also a very

new SIR member.

Our book this past month was The Premonition: A Pandemic Story, by the local author, Michael Lewis.

This is the story of the early days and the ongoing efforts to contain and control the Covid-19 virus. The lead characters in the book were a group of seven who were experts in their various fields, and were given the name the "Wolverines." These people were experts in their various fields, but did not enjoy major recognition by the public. From the book:

Michael Lewis: The Wolverines were a group of seven doctors, all of whom at one point or another had worked in the White House together, and who stayed in contact and kind of helped the country navigate various, various previous disease outbreaks. But they weren't in the decision making apparatus in the U.S. government.

Much of the book focused on the dysfunction of the government at many levels, with people in positions of power being political appointees who were not always equipped to handle their jobs. The major character here was a doctor named Charity Dean, who had been a public health doctor and then the public health officer in Santa Barbara County, who was recruited to be the State's public health assistant director. She had worked long and hard to learn about Covid-19 and the treatment approaches that could work. The Covid-19 problem in California continued to worsen and the public health director resigned. Dr. Dean assumed she would be the next public health director, but our governor brought in another person with no experience in this field who had better "optics." Dr. Dean did get an audience with the governor, who was all ears on this subject.

Apparently the most recent efforts to deal with a pandemic began when President George W. Bush read a book on the subject, The Great Influenza: the Story of the Deadliest Pandemic in History, by John Barry, which covered the 1918 "Spanish Flu" pandemic. The President

then began the effort to prepare for another such event, but the effort faded with the next administration, and President Trump did not pick up the ball on this.

Technology problems also surfaced, with institutions that used fax machines or sometimes did not even have fax machines unable to acquire free test kits because their computers would not accept "0" in the cost field (sound familiar?).

The CDC and the WHO came in for plenty of criticism also. The CDC requirement that test kits be produced by and purchased from it stalled the testing program, while the Wolverine group's model said that focused testing and quick turnaround time were absolutely necessary. The group had lots of data to back up its positions. One of the group reminded us of a saying in the business of putting out fires, "if you wait for the smoke to clear, it's too late."

I learned of the legal power and authority that the officials in the public health arena have, such as when they order a shutdown of say, schools. Yes, in California they have that legal authority. The rules vary significantly from state to state.

Most of us thought this was an easy read, and something of a page turner, and illustrated the tug-of-war between the "little people" with the knowledge doing the real work and the people who wished to present the best information without causing a panic.

The book is germane to our time, and frames the battle as it happened. If we ever do put this to bed, what preplanned responses will be in place next time something like this happens? Will the binder with the instructions be empty?

The book chosen for next month is *Hamnet* by Maggie O'Farrell, a story of William Shakespeare's wife and family, about which little is known. Speculation is that the son named Hamnet was the inspiration for Hamlet.

We meet next on Monday, August 23rd , at the Greenery.


