
### Reservations for Ladies Day Luncheon which will be held Via Zoom

Utilizing the meeting application ZOOM combined with the presentation capability of You Tube, we will virtually create the live environment of the Ladies Day Luncheon. There will be multiple tables of ten diners sitting around socializing in virtual ZOOM Breakout Rooms with participants that you help select, much like was done in past year's actual environment at Boundary Oak.

Each table (Breakout Room) will be assigned a table leader. I have sent notices to all table leaders from our last live luncheon in December 2019, encouraging them to volunteer to lead one or more of the tables this year. It will be their role to invite SIR singles and couples to join them at their table. An optimum table will have five couples to promote all around conversation. **Steve Ybarra** has agreed to handle the reservation process which will be as follows:

• Step 1—Send an email or call Steve Ybarra, (siybar@gmail.com, 925.676.7405) letting him know you wish to attend the Ladies Day Luncheon Zoom meeting. List your name and your wife or partner's name and any other guests you would like to join you at a table. Provide email(s) where you wish to receive your Zoom Invitation, if different. If a table leader has already contacted you to join them, than you just need to confirm with **Steve,** providing any email(s) where you wish to receive your ZOOM invitation, that you will be joining the table led by the name of your leader. **Steve** will assign your table number.

- Step 2—You will receive an invitation to join the Ladies Day Luncheon via Zoom a couple of days before the event. Seating at your table will open on December 10th at 11 am, so you may check in at this time or any time after. The table leaders plan to start discussions at 11:15 am so don't be late.
- Step 3—When you click on the Zoom link, you will enter a waiting room. You will then be let into the main meeting area. Immediately upon being let into the main meeting area, you should rename your picture according to the instructions that will be provided along with the invitation. If you have difficulty, one of the co-hosts will be able to assist you. Based on the name associated with your picture you will be automatically moved to your assigned room or table.
- Step 4—At 12 noon, we will bring everyone back in to the main room and Big SIR will welcome you to the Luncheon and provide any announcements prior to the start of the 15 minute video featuring the Diablo Mountain Chorus singing holiday songs in their own unique stylized flair. After the video, the SongSIRS will sing God Bless America and then the meeting will adjourn.

**Russ's** education was interrupted by World War II. Out of Watertown high school in June 1943, **Russ** enlisted in the Navy on the 4<sup>th</sup> of July and served as a radioman/gunner on dive and torpedo bombers on the USS Randolph and the USS Philippine Sea. He was discharged from the Navy as a second-class petty officer.

In 1948, **Russ** moved to Louisville, KY and took a clerical job with the Louisville and Nashville Railroad. The same year he married his wonderful wife **Opal.** and they raised 3 children and have 4 grandchildren and 2 great-grandchildren. **Russ** also enrolled at the University of Louisville,

while working for the railroad, graduating with a degree in Business Administration.

In 1953, **Russ** started a 33-year career with IBM – Big Blue. This included time as a marketing representative, marketing manager, branch manager, and as President and CEO of IBM Korea from 1982 to 1985.

Russ and Opal moved to Moraga in 1968 and have lived in the same home ever since. Russ loves all sports and has participated in swimming, baseball, football, and ice hockey. Russ ran many 10K races and 5-half marathons, is an avid reader, and enjoyed traveling throughout the USA and 30 foreign countries. - The table is set for one... symbolizing the frailty of one against many oppressors.
- The table cloth is white symbolizing the purity of intention and the selfless dedication of those who answered their country's call to arms.

- The single red rose represents the families and loved ones who keep the faith awaiting our missing comrades return.
- The red ribbon reminds us of the ribbons worn by those who continue to bear witness of an undying determination to obtain a proper accounting of our missing comrades.
- A slice of lemon on the plate reminds us of the bitter fate of some.
- The salt beside it reminds us of the tears of families who suffered loss and of those who still wait for news of the missing.
- The glass is inverted... they cannot be here to toast with us.
- The chair is empty... for those who are not here.
- The napkin is unfolded as if used... just as the lives of our comrades were sacrificed in the service of their country.
- The solitary red candle stands straight and tall as our courageous comrades did. It is red for the blood they shed.

When lit, the candle shines forth the light of hope for the return of the missing which lives on in the hearts of their loved ones... may it light their way home... into the arms of a loving family and a grateful nation.

We remember with deep gratitude all who made the ultimate sacrifice of their very lives. May those who gave their lives in the service of our country rest in eternal peace in the loving mercy and compassion of Almighty God. They will never be forgotten nor will those who are still missing.

There is no more difficult responsibility than to command troops in combat and no more daunting task than to inform families of a comrade's injury or loss. We pray that the Lord's guidance and wisdom be with all who govern or command our armed forces. May they guard a world at peace.



### AREA 16 Fishing Report Paul Dubow

The directive from State SIR put an end to our planned trips, hopefully just temporarily. We had just completed the draft of our schedule for 2021 when the ban was announced. Nevertheless, a few us managed to take a few trips before the ban was implemented and

others will continue to fish on their own in small groups. Some of the pre-ban outings are described in the next few paragraphs and we are hopeful that we can resume sponsored trips in early 2021.

Ron Lew of Branch 146 had quite an adventure landing a 58-inch sturgeon, just two inches less than the limit. He was fishing in the Delta with a friend when the friend hooked the big fish. Ron's friend handed the rod to him and, after a nice fight, Ron brought the fish to the side of the boat and called for the net. It turned out that his friend only had a small net that would have been good for hauling in stripers, but not sturgeon. Ultimately, Ron was able to grab the sturgeon at its mouth and drag it into the boat. It was quite an effort because the fish weighed about 70 lbs. On another outing, Ron tried his luck salmon fishing just before the season ended and reported that he managed to land a salmon that was the size of an anchovy. However, he did boat some nice rockfish.

**Rich Fiscina** of Branch 146 managed two fishing outings and a crab outing on his boat. On one trip with friends, the group caught a 20-pound salmon and a ten pounder. On a family trip, six small halibut and a 16-inch striper were caught. The crab trip was very successful. A group of four bagged the limit of ten each, with 32 jumbo crabs and eight smaller ones.

Mike Browne of Branch 146 returned to the mouth of the Napa River and caught a bunch of stripers fishing from shore, but they were all shakers. Phil Scimonelli fished on the Martinez pier and caught a bunch of shaker stripers, but he also landed a couple of keepers. He moved on to the Pinole pier on another trip, picking up both leopard sharks and sand sharks. Out on the Delta, Karl Droese and Dick Thomson were only able to land two shakers, while Ken Bellendir did worse, fishing but not catching on a sturgeon trip.

**Brion Beetz** was our most prolific fisherman this month. He went out six times. Three of the trips were with **Carl Moyer.** The pair caught limits of rockfish, plus two ling cod and two halibut. **Brion** also landed nine halibut,

releasing some, while fishing in the Richmond Flats, and he limited out on a crab trip.

Even though we have suspended our fishing trips and monthly breakfast meetings, we are still meeting on Zoom. They are fun gatherings, as we join in breakout rooms of eight or nine fishermen and talk about fishing and life in general and then reconvene for group business and to describe our most recent trips. 



Five members of the SIR 146 Book Group, on-line version, met via Zoom on Monday, November 9th. Our Zoom Master continues to be **Mike Farrar**. One member, **Paul Dubow**, joined us virtually from his

rented Maui condo, and has indicated that he intends to stay there until the pandemic is over. He will travel back and forth virtually to the Mainland as needed. The view he shared from Napili was magnificent, with the island of Lanai in the background — not a bad way to self-quarantine!

Our selection for this month was The Darwin Affair, by Tim Mason. The reviews in the front of the book are simply endless and all are extremely laudatory - this pretty well says it all. The book is set in Victorian England, primarily London, and is full of historical characters such as Charles Dickens and Charles It is an historical mystery and suspense Darwin. Queen Victoria and Prince Albert are also novel. featured. The guestion in hand seems to be should Charles Darwin receive a knighthood? There are two strong and opposing sides to this question, and resorting to murder and assassination are not out of the question. There are both societal rank and financial issues around this questions, IE, creationism vs. evolution. We learned that Charles Darwin did not publish his book, The Origin of the Species until several years had passed since he wrote it, due to the controversy he knew it would ignite.

The leading villain is a real villain, maybe even a sociopath, and highly skilled at his trade as a surgeon, which is part of the plot. His pursuer is patterned after "Mr. Bucket," a Dickensian character, and he is often being called that by those around him. He is actually quite competent as you would expect a Chief Inspector in London. His pursuit as he uncovers the plot, also uncovers many characters, including someone who plays the role of Typhoid Mary!

We learned about the underside of London life, including the sale of the newly dead as cadavers for the use of medical students – it was a regular business! Everybody made money. Many young people lived in very poor circumstances, such as a young boy who lived in a barrel on the bank of the River Thames, and stayed alive by scouring the river bank for items of value, as well as other nearby "opportunities" to make a few pence.

Oxford had its turn as a setting for a lecture on the Darwin book, with one of the Oxford Dons playing a part. Some of the setting was in Germany, the ancestral home of Prince Albert, a husband who truly loved his wife the Queen. A market in London also held part of the "action," with a central place where many of the book's characters came and went. The author's skill wove the various plot lines together very well.


The book seemed to start slowly, and end at a mighty pace. We agreed that it was well written, an easy read, and while having a lot of characters, it was not hard to follow. We're thinking that Mr. Dickens was a major source for our author. The SIR 146 Book Group definitely recommends this book.

### Nine Hole Golf Group Verner Laursen


