
Most of the activities are now open. We only have seven that are still on hold, but hopefully will open soon. Unfortunately, nine activities have closed due to lack of participation.






Travel Milt Smith







- The journey reminds me of Tom Sawyer or Huckleberry Finn.
- Loved the book. Don't judge a book by its cover.
- "Good read," but felt it was unfinished wanted to know how it ended (or where it went next on the journey.)
- Let the story come to you.
- A book to read if you are willing to expect the unexpected. The plot line is not the real story, the characters fulfill this role.
