That means we will assume you are attending unless you notify the luncheon coordinators, as described in the monthly meeting announcement. Should you fail to opt out by the monthly deadline and then not attend the luncheon, you will likely have to pay for the meal you missed. This is because our Branch commits to a number of meals each month, based on the feedback we receive from members. Our Branch is also reinstating our existing by-law which requires mem-

Exceptions to the attendance by-law require approval by the Branch Executive Committee (BEC) and are only valid for a period of six months. Please contact either the Big Sir, Little Sir or the Membership Committee Chair if you believe you need an exception.

We Are All-Ears

To improve your experience at luncheons, we have been making adjustments to the audio system. As the speakers and mixer are owned by Boundary Oak, we have to adjust the settings and speaker placement each month. Bill Holly has been testing the system each month, before everyone arrives, to optimize the sound, especially for the tables on the sides and back of the room. We hope you have noticed some improvement over the past two months; please let Bill or me know if you have.

Recognizing that even with these changes, the current system may still not be sufficient, we will be enlisting the assistance of a sound engineer. Whether it requires additional speakers, different microphones, or other system updates, your BEC is committed to ensuring that most members in attendance can comfortably hear the proceedings.

Our 101 Members and three guests who attended our November luncheon honored our military and Merchant Marine veterans. We heard a very informative description of health and medical services available

to veterans from Vickilynn Kimbro and Laura Crawley of U.S. Veterans Affairs Northern California Healthcare Systems.

In December, we will hold our annual Holiday Luncheon which is arranged by **Steve Ybarra**.

Our January 12 meeting will feature Zach Harris from John Muir Health who will discuss the Future of Healthcare.

It is very important to note that starting with the January meeting, we will revert to our pre-pandemic practice of expecting that you will attend each luncheon unless you have been given Exempt status by the BEC or have opted-out by the deadline for that meeting. It is also expected that you will attend at least five regular luncheons in any twelve-month period. Also, note that that, due to inflation, Boundary Oak has increased the cost of our luncheons and they will now cost **\$36**.

The BEC has made the decision to make this change for several reasons. First, with the threat of COVID waning, most of us have been able to return to a somewhat normal lifestyle. Second, it is important for the survival of our Branch that the membership has a sense of belonging to the group and a forum for communication with the BEC. AREA 16 Fishing Report

Striper fishing and crabbing have been the hot spots this month, although the striper bite is starting to slow down a bit.

Stan Wong caught 96 stripers in five trips to the Delta, releasing all but a few. **Tom Kostik** and **Harry Sherinian** landed 21 stripers, including six keepers, on a Delta outing. A few days later, **Tom** and **Mike Corker** hooked 52 stripers, but only two were keepers. All these fish were caught with lures, with swimbait being the favorite. However, **Ron Lew** of Branch 146 had a good striper day using sardines as bait. He also caught two leopard sharks on the same trip.

In the crab department, a group of six set out on the *Sundance* and netted 80 Dungeness crabs and 25 rock crabs. After the crabbing was done, they fished for rockfish. Although they caught quite a few, most of them were smaller than usual. **Stan Wong** caught 50 Dungeness crabs at a spot about ten miles offshore and within sight of the Farallones.

Bob Stein had an unusual experience fishing for rockfish with **Carl Moyer** and **Brion Beetz**. He thought his line was stuck on rocks, which is not unusual while fishing for the well-named rockfish. He gave the rod to **Carl** to free the line. After a while, the line tugged, and **Carl** realized that there was a fish on the other end. **Bob** reeled the line in with great effort and eventually, a 25 lb. ling cod came to the surface. It was a traveler, i.e., it was not hooked but instead was attempting to eat a rockfish that **Bob** had hooked. At that point, **Brion** expertly placed the net under the ling cod, who released its prey and fell into the net. And so, **Bob** had two fish on the same cast!

Bob Lively of Branch 146, who is our Big Fish, also had an unusual experience, catching a 10 lb. guitarfish while fishing with **Ron Lew**. He had never seen a guitarfish before. He played it for a long time before landing it. On another trip, **Bob** caught a limit of rockfish plus a ling cod while fishing with **Rich Fiscina** of Branch 146.

Our favorite local trout fishing venue, San Pablo Reservoir, closed for the season on October 31. Before the closing, **Carl Moyer** and **Phil Scimonelli** caught a limit of rainbows. But subsequent trips were not as successful. **Carl** and **Gordon Linebaugh** caught just one fish (by **Gordon**) and then **Mike Browne** and


Phil Scimonelli were skunked. San Pablo will reopen on February 14.

Where in the world is our Travel Coordinator? Why traveling of course.


