Our goal is to have at least 50 guests attend one of the 10 general lunches that we have (we had 1 new member and 4 guests in January). If there is an activity they would like to participate in that we do not currently sponsor, no problem, with their help will add it to our list. We have a number of brochures that we will set out on the name-tag table at each luncheon and we invite you to take one or more and use it to help inform a friend. 



means it will be somewhat unpleasant to walk the single-track trails. So that means that there will be muddy boots among other things. My intention is to pick venues that have gravel, asphalt, or concrete surfaces from now until the end of February. And that presents opportunities to visit several of the bayside venues, which for the most part, are gravel or paved. This also presents some wonderful opportunities to observe shore birds and various species of waterfowl. These hard surface trails also do not present much in the way of arduous climbs. So maybe some of the couch potatoes out there might want to join us on some of these walks for the rest of the winter season.

I also have a recommendation for the "walkers" out there. East Bay Regional Parks publishes an annual "trail challenge" book which describes about 2 dozen selected hikes. These hikes are rated "easy, moderate, or strenuous". Go to the website www.ebparks.org and search for trail challenge. You can download this entire document as a PDF file and then use it for own walking challenges. You can also visit one of the 5 EBRP visitor centers to pick up a hard copy of the book as well as a Trails Challenge t-shirt.

The other comment about East Bay Regional Parks is that there are about 40 different venues with a total area of about 125,000 acres. I have been told that this is the largest park system in the USA.

To date this rainy season, I think If any of you have suggestions for any hikes that you we have done well with respect have enjoyed, or would like me to include your ideas in to total rainfall. This next 5 days planning, please let me know. I/we are always open to (01/19 to 01/23) looks to be new venues. Also, spouses and guests are always welvery productive with respect to rain. But that also come. Our canine friends will be allowed on leash if the hiking venue permits it.


Nine Hole Golf Group Bob Ford

The gentle 1-mile trail ended at a point overlooking the arm of the Upper San Leandro Reservoir. The highlight of the trip was a juvenile Bald Eagle, that was hunting ducks (unsuccessfully) and frequently perched in a pine tree near where we were standing. Quite the magnificent show. We ended up spotting 39 species of birds including Hooded Merganzers, 90 Common Merganzers, Green-winged Teal, a Spotted Sandpiper and a White-throated sparrow. The Wood Ducks were missed but we heard a female calling from her hidden hiding spot along the river. Our next field trip is scheduled for 8:30 AM on February 14th. AREA 16 Fishing Report

We are in a bit of fishing limbo right now because the Department of Fish and Wildlife has not yet released all its 2024 fishing regulations. In 2023, sturgeon limits were reduced, salmon fish-

ing was banned, the halibut limit was reduced from three to two, and rockfish angling was limited to depths more than 300 feet which meant that fishermen had to sail to the Farallones if they wanted to catch rockfish.

We expect the same restrictions for 2024, but so far, only the restrictions on sturgeon have been announced. For the second straight year, fishermen will be limited to one sturgeon per year and the sturgeon that is kept must be within the slot limit, which is between 40 and 60 inches. We have not heard anything about salmon, but we expect that the 2023 ban will continue into 2024. The rockfish season ended, as usual, on December 31. Normally, it resumes around April 1, but we do not know if there even will be a rockfish season in 2024 and, if so, whether the 300 feet limitation will stay in effect. In 2023, the 300 feet limitation ended on July 1 and, to our surprise, it was reinstated on July 15. Finally, we expect the halibut limit to remain at two fish. That is a good thing as the elimination of the salmon season put tremendous pressure on the halibut population because many fishermen who normally would fish for salmon between May and October turned their attention to halibut.

Because of the restrictions described above, our efforts in January concentrated on trout and, to a lesser extent, stripers. The highlight in the trout department was the 7 lb. rainbow that **Pete Gates** landed at Shadow Cliffs Reservoir. **Carl Moyer, Stan Wong,** and **Ken Bellindir** also landed trout at Shadow Cliffs. **Bob Lively** who, unlike the other trout fishermen, does not drop anchor and instead trolls for rainbows from his kayak, also was rewarded with some nice trout and, as a bonus, a 5 lb. catfish. **Ron Lew** also kayaked for a few trout at Shadow Cliffs.

Tom Kostik, Stan Wong, Ron Lew, Phil Scimonelli, and Harry Sherinian all fished in the Delta for stripers, and all were successful.

We also enjoyed our annual Christmas dinner at Zio Fraedo's. For the past ten years or so, **Pete Gates** has organized this dinner, but he now has retired from this task (but not retired from fishing) and he will be re-

placed by **Rich Fiscina.** Thanks, Pete, for your great efforts over the years!

Our next meeting will be on January 25 at the Legends Bar and Grill, at Diablo Creek Golf Course, 4050 Port Chicago Highway, in Concord. The meeting begins at 8:30 am but come earlier for breakfast (beginning at 7 am) for camaraderie and fish stories. All SIR members are welcome, even if one has never fished before or has not fished for a long time and all SIR members are invited on our outings. If you have no equipment, we will lend you ours. 
We gathered at Margot's Somerville's home for a night of cards and camaraderie. Our guests for the evening were Elaine and Ken Richter and
