




### Activities Coordinator Bob Lucido

Like many other activities, participation was down significantly from pre-pandemic levels. We had only three teams compete, one from Branch 146 and two from Branch 19. I am sad to announce that our team of Brands, Wallace, Marlovits, and Hinkle came in second and probably did not qualify for the finals at Rancho Solano in Fairfield on Monday, August 8. Normally the second place team would have qualified but only the first place teams are guaranteed slots, the others are allocated based on Area participation.

Our next State Event will be the individual Championship. The Area 16 qualifying event will be held at Blue Rock Springs West on Thursday July 7. An invitation to sign up will be circulated shortly. Blue Rock Springs will allow a shotgun start if we have at least 64 people participating, a number that seems somewhat unlikely at this point. The state spring fling event had just under 100 players participate and the Reno event had to be canceled due to lack of participation.





Almanor Lake trip in Canyon Dam. Our hosts were

John and Deb Crotty. John served as our guide and Deb provided us with delicious meals. Unfortunately, the lodge burned down in the Dixie Fire this winter. However, we found a VRBO only five minutes from John and Deb's new home. And so, eight of us journeyed to the lake for two fished all day on Pedro's boat, but only were able to land a days, where John continued to guide us and Deb few undersized halibut. Near the end of the day, Ken continued to feed us. And the results were great. Deb's meals were terrific and we caught 36 trout, mostly rainbows plus two large browns. Our second trip to the lake is tentatively set for October 17-18.

We had two other out of town trips. **Tom Kostik** made his annual trek to Pinecrest Lake, where he caught seven smallmouth bass and three rainbows. Joe Miscione and his son had an unusual time at New Melones Reservoir. They set out on a kokanee trip on the lake. Within the first fifteen minutes, they caught two large rainbows on kokanee rigs. Then their outboard motor died and they had to quit. Thus, their kokanee trip resulted in two trout and no kokanee.

Most of our local activity in May was in the Delta and San Pablo Reservoir. In the Delta, Paul Dubow of Branch 146, Karl Droese, Gordon Linebaugh, and Dick Thomson spent a morning on the San Joaquin and Mokelumne Rivers and landed a dozen stripers, seven of which were keepers. Tom Kostik caught thirteen stripers, including three keepers, on an all day trip. On another outing, he landed nine black bass. Harry Sherinian caught five black bass on a Delta foray. However, Mike Corker failed to get a bite fishing from his boat. Timing is everything! Not all Delta fishing is from boats. Phil Scimonelli and his wife, along with Mike Browne of Branch 146, caught seven trout and a ray fishing from the Point Pinole pier.

At San Pablo Reservoir, the results were mixed. **Bob Lively,** fishing chair **Paul Dubow** at 510-504-3566. who fishes from a kayak, picked up trout on several trips to the reservoir. Mike Browne and Phil Scimonelli hooked several trout fishing from the shore, but Brion Beetz and Gordon Linebaugh failed to catch a single trout fishing from a boat. **Brion** did catch a catfish the size of a pinky. But that actually was a good thing. It was a sign that catfish are now spawning in the reservoir and we are

May has been the best fishing Although the salmon season began in late April, none of us month of the year to date. The ventured out to fish for them. Lots of attention was paid to schools, work situations if any, and their families. The effort was seemingly to fill in the blanks about their lives and their motivations in joining the team.

There was a lot of discussion/comments/ worrying by the main characters about "what's going to happen to me next," and conflicting thoughts around nationalism as they wrestled with their loyalties to China and the United States. Their lives in this country as Chinese-Americans were not always simple or easy.

> One almost thought that this was a story by the author, who like one of the team members, grew up in rural Texas, to deliver the message that museums around the world must return the "stolen" pieces that are in their collections. And yes, there is a surprise ending.

> Our group is giving this a C- rating and not recommending it. It is not a "true detective" story, but plays on various themes such as nationalism, life with mixed ethnicities, the feelings that stolen artwork should be returned, and life in their families.

> Our next book is the Tango War, by Mary Jo McConahay, which examines the relationship between the United States and countries in Central and South America during World War II. We meet again at the Greenery at 9 am on June 13<sup>th</sup>.






A small and intimate gathering of 8 met at host SIR member Jim Stedman's lovely community room at Rossmoor for the May 13th Mexican Train Uno games.

That is until you exercise hard and feel the hot spot in your chest. The blood backs up and you hurt.

Three weeks went by agonizingly slow. 5 am on the 21st of April finally arrived. I checked in. By 7 am I was full of pipes, tubes, IV's, all assorted hoses and wires.

Some 6 hours later I was awake in ICU. No pain just bewilderment. Still in disbelief. The Doc came by and told You're kidding I said. Must be me he had to repair 4 clogs. He said the "widow maker" he was clogged shut. Again, exercise saved me.

> The surgeon by the luck of the draw was rated the number one guy in California. He glued my new zipper as opposed to stitch and clamp. Lucky me.

> After 4 days I was sent home. Medicare sends a team of PT folks, RNs, and assorted professionals to your home. They work with you to get you moving again. Nice people.

> Its been 4 weeks now. Recovery is work. I walk, and lift really light weights to begin the process of recovery.

> The message here is this: The Doctors are not eager to pursue your ills. They MUST be pushed. You must research the ailment prior to seeing a Doc.

> By being persistent you can short circuit a big ouch. We pass thru this life only once. Do not be lazy, get to your Doctor with your aches. Get in his/her face and insist they check you out.

> Stay active. Sweat. Do not sit on your butt while your life floats by. If you have a family history of heart problems stay ahead of it.

Don't wind up on the obits we read every day.
