Our Ladies Day luncheon entertainment with the banjo group was energetic and loads of fun. They even managed to get a few of us to join in on the singing!



In June our speaker is Zach Harris, Vice President, Ancillary Service at John Muir Health who will speak on The Future of Healthcare. In July we will have Charles Fracchia of ABC News to speak on Top Scams Targeting Older Adults.

I attended a meeting last week sponsored by our Area SIRs Representative **Jay Gordon** that included six of the 9 BIG SIRs. I sat in for **Bob Wilkenfeld** as he had other commitments. **Jay** presented a spreadsheet showing that the average of all but one of the Branches was 80 years of age. We had the most members followed closely by Branch 8 which also meets at Boundary Oaks. The average for all of the branches in attendance was 160 members. Membership dues varied from \$25 to \$40. Branch 8 uses part of their dues to defer luncheon costs. Our luncheon attendance has been about 52% of membership while others varied from 45% to 61%. Luncheon costs varied from \$30 to \$36.

The major problems cited for the low attendance was threefold: Quality of the speakers, Quality of the food (one of the groups has a buffet) and the issue of Are the Meetings Fun. Our Branch has been working on the speaker issue and the food as well as keeping the length of the meetings crisp but how do we make them more entertaining? One suggestion at the meeting was to place a few 3x4 cards on each table and ask that members who have ideas or concerns to provide anonymous comments for the BEC to address. I will raise that point at our next BEC meeting.

Across the board, all branches are struggling with recruiting. We need to get you, our members, to contact friends, acquaintances and others who might be interested to come and have a look at us at our luncheons. I have been thinking of putting an ad in our church bulletin and perhaps a flyer with business type contact cards at the 24-Hour Fitness center I attend. Would love to hear your thoughts.




Cycling Group Larry Kaye

The Pacific Locomotive Association, Inc. operates Niles Canyon Railway as a living history museum interpreting the importance of our heritage railroads in the development of California and the nation. The purpose of the organization is to preserve the physical aspects and atmosphere of Pacific Coast railroading during the period from 1910 to 1960. Our mission is to develop and operate a working railroad museum for the benefit of the general public. Operating historic railroad equipment using standard railroad practices for train crews, signaling, block operations, and equipment maintenance.

- Preserving the atmosphere of railroads in small-town America before the 1960s by connecting the historic communities of Sunol, the Niles District of Fremont, and eventually Pleasanton.

The California Independent System Operator (ISO) maintains reliability on one of the largest and most modern power grids in the world, and operates a transparent, accessible wholesale energy market. The organization works diligently around the clock to meet the electricity needs of consumers, while increasing the amount of renewable energy to usher in the clean, green grid of the future. We had 13 people join the tour; Ed and Audry Marlovitz, Steve and Susan Oki, Rih Pace, John Pearl. Dave Pierce, Jim and Renie Pope, Ron Louis and Fran Matthews. The tour covered the history of the ISO, the how and why the California ISO was formed. And then we proceeded to an observation conference room where we all could see the many 7 X 24 hour desks and large screen (the width of the room about 200 feet across) showing the Western US electric grid operating in real time. We observed the many areas that were being monitored like electric markets and electric reliability of the State and the Western US.


Book Group John Pearl, Interim Chair

There are some distinct similarities in the two books, as they are both set in World War II, and are the stories of the "Resistance" in France and Italy.

Let the Peacock Sing was written by a local author and fellow SIR, Michael Barrington, a member and former Big Sir of Branch 116. The Reknown sistance was in the France by name




"Maquis," and was supported by the Allies, primarily the British through the S.O.E., Churchill's "Secret Service."

This goes on for several months until Pino gets an urgent message to return home. He does and finds out that on his upcoming 18th birthday he will become eligible for the






