We're monitoring with anticipation that Contra Costa County is moving down the priority list for the COVID vaccine. Perhaps within a few short months we will have been vaccinated.


Until then we are playing it safe.

February SIR Branch 146 Award Ceremony Honoring Ron Binder

Your Honoree Committee feels that it is important to let you, our members, know what type award is being presented and why. You should also know that in every case the awardee and his award is approved by the BEC at a meeting held late in the year before the next year's luncheon meetings.

First, we have what could be called "quantitative" awards which the recipient is awarded for achieving one of three different age-related milestones: Senior Sir - 90 years of age; Super Senior Sir - 95 years of age; and Century Sir - 100 years of age. In addition, we award the 20 Year Membership Award to members.

The second set are "merit based" awards. One is the Branch Honoree, the second is The Branch Certificate of Appreciation and the third is HLM. The Branch Honoree is the highest award our Branch bestows on a member, and it is based on achieving points for various volunteer and leadership positions within our Branch, with 45 points being the minimum number. The second award is The Branch Certificate of Appreciation and is given to a member based on his branch involvement, regardless of points accumulated. The third merit award is the prestigious HLM (Honorary Life Member) and Sr. HLM that has its own set of State SIR rules and criteria.



This month, it is my personal honor to present The Branch Honoree award to **Ron Binder.**


Ron is a native San Franciscan, born in March, 1939. He grew up there, spending fun summers at the family cabin in the Santa Cruz Mountains. **Ron** graduated in 1957 from Lincoln High School and immediately joined the Army. After boot camp at Fort Ord, **Ron** was sent to Fort Sam Houston in Texas. It was there that he was given advanced training to become a medic. Upon completion of active duty, Ron returned to the Bay Area and continued his military reserve status, as well as enrolling at City College of San Francisco in the Hotel/Restaurant Management program. After he obtained his AA degree in restaurant management in 1960, **Ron** joined Mannings Food Company from 1960 to 1973, and later Servomation from 1973 to 1986. During

this period of time, he also served in the US Army Medical Corps reserve for eight years, ending his military commitment in 1965. He then went into hospital management, working at Mills Peninsula Hospital, in San Jose; Sutter Solano Medical Center, in Vallejo; and John Muir Medical Center here in Walnut Creek, where he retired in 2005 having achieved the title of Director of Food Services.

He joined our Branch in March of 2006, sponsored by **Rich Hanford**. **Ron** has worked very diligently in a variety of activities since joining our Branch. Here are some facts you may not be aware of that relate to **Ron**. Over the years, **Ron** has been an avid golfer and he immediately became involved with the Golf Committee where he served as Chair for three years (2007 to 2009). He has also been the Chair of a cooking group, Tres Gourmet, serving consecutively since 2011 to now. As if that's not enough, **Ron** chaired our Recruiting Group for three years from 2012 to 2014; and also was a Branch Director in 2009. **Ron's** first wife **Cathy**, passed away, and he and his second wife, **Karen**, now live in Rossmoor and play as much golf (generally nine holes at a time) as health permits. He was presented The Certificate of Appreciation Award in 2016.

When you next see **Ron**, please express your appreciation for his many years spent on behalf of Branch 146, and for that, we today present him with the coveted Branch Honoree Award.





February SIR Branch 146 Award Ceremony Honoring Jonathan Korfhage



Our next award is presented to **Jonathan Korfhage**, and it is a very well deserved Certificate of Appreciation Award. **Jonathan** was born in March, 1942, in Minnesota. He was the son of a Methodist preacher and his family was recreation oriented. That proved to be the basis of Jonathan's entire professional business career.

Jonathan came to California to attend San Jose State University, from which he graduated with a Bachelor of Arts in Recreation, with honors.

Following college, he embarked on a career of over 50 years in the field of parks and recreation. He spent 25 years with the City of Oakland as a recreation supervisor, managing playgrounds, camps, sports and aquatics, department training, the arts programs, lake operations, and information technology, just to name some of the many activities in which he spent his time. He then served as an administrative assistant with the East Bay Regional Park District, working on a variety of special programs. During that period, he wrote a book about the history of parks and recreation in Santa Clara County. He eventually retired as superintendent of parks,

recreation, and vehicles for the City of Foster City. He still holds the title of a certified park and recreation professional.

Jonathan has been very active in the National Recreation and Park Association, in which he is a charter member and a past president. He recently served as the organization's Western Services Coordinator. He has also been a member of the California Parks and Recreation Society since the early 1960s. He served as president of the Society in 1988-89 and was the recipient of its highest recognition, the Fellowship Award. He is currently the Society's historian. He also has served as chair of the Cal Poly San Luis Obispo Recreation Advisory Council and continues to participate in that organization.

He entered our Branch in March of 2012 sponsored by **Pete McNeill**. He immediately jumped into volunteer work on behalf of the branch as primary greeter for three (3) years, during which time he donned a variety of humorous and catchy costumes. He became the "court jester," if you will, during his days as greeter, often wearing apparel which was consistent with the subject to be presented by the speaker for the day. Following his days as greeter, he jumped into the infamous "rotation" of assignments with positions of Assistant Secretary (2016), Secretary (2017), Little Sir (2018),

all leading to the position of Big Sir in 2019. During this same time he chaired the Valentine's Day dance for four years of 2017 thru 2020. In the now dreaded year of 2020, he chaired the Nominating Committee for the branch as well.

He and his wife **Barbara** enjoy traveling, writing, music, puppetry, theatre, and spending time with family and friends. This very active couple also frequents the golf course at Boundary Oak. Finally, he is currently on the Board of Directors of Shelter, Inc., a non-profit in Contra Costa County working to alleviate homelessness and is also writing a book about the history of parks and recreation in California.

Response from Republic Services to our questions:

At our January meeting the speaker was Elena Mejia Recycling Coordinator with Republic Services, the local waste collection service. Her presentation garnered a lot of questions. For any, that she did not have immediate answers for she promised to get back to us. She took these back with the promise to research them and get back to us. And so she has, these were her replies sent through Jerry Kaplan:

sold?

A: We do an annual compost giveaway for RecycleSmart Q: We continue to pay a deposit on containers like soft residents (see attached photo of the service area) typically in May (not sure if it will happen this year due to Covid-19). Forward also does work with a commercial compost bag- many government programs it seems to have hit a brick ger to sell the compost in some hardware stores but it wont necessarily say its from Forward Compost Facility. The compost has the following certifications: CDFA (CA Dept Food and Ag), OMRI listed (Organic Materials Review Institute), STA Certified (Seal of Testing Assurance – USCC). OMRI Listed® products are allowed for use in certified organic operations under the USDA National Organic Program.

Q: Is there any enforcement for contamination in residential carts?

A: We do a little bit - our drivers keep an eye out for contamination when they are dumping carts but it can be hard to see if it's hidden at the bottom of a cart, and usually it'll be too late since it's already getting dumped. But they do note accounts that are continually contaminating with a tag and we don't service it until they remove the contamination before their next service day, or they pay for us to service it as trash 1x. It's easiest to see contamination if the customer is also overloading the cart since the lid will be propped open and some contents will be visible.

Q: Why does Mt Diablo Resource Recovery not accept any Styrofoam?

A: It is not easily recyclable (hard to find markets for it) or economically efficient to recycle Styrofoam, especially since its so light but bulky.

Q: Is the recycling facility having trouble with finding places who will take our recyclables?

A: Yes, especially since China Sword (they stopped accepting most types of materials starting in 2018), and other countries have also started limiting what they will take. This has forced the recycling sorting facility to be even Q: Is the compost from Forward rated Organic and is it more stringent, and that's why we try to do education and outreach about clean recycling.

> A: This is a question for CalRecycle. I have not heard back from them yet, but their website kind of touches on this:

> How are recycling funds spent? (Fiscal Year 2016-2017 estimates)

> Sales of CRV beverage containers in Fiscal Year 2016-17 are projected to bring in approximately \$1.2 billion in deposits to California's Beverage Container Recycling Fund. Of that total, \$1.05 billion goes toward CRV redemption payments to consumers.

> When used beverage containers are thrown away instead of recycled, the unclaimed CRV refunds are used to pro-

Competitive grants: \$1.5 million

Payments to support curbside recycling programs: \$15 mil-

Grants to local conservation corps: \$6.8 million

Payments to recycling centers sited at supermarkets to

ensure consumer convenience: \$46.7 million

Market Development Payment Program to promote reuse of plastics discards: \$10 million

<u>Payments to cities and counties</u>: \$10.5 million per year for beverage container recycling and litter cleanup activities

Program administration: approximately \$51.1 million.





AREA 16 Fishing Report

We are happy to report that State SIR has authorized the opening of outdoor activities provided that there is compliance with local rules regarding COVID 19 and that Branch 146 has approved fishing activity, again so long as the fishermen abide

by local rules.

Prior to the opening, several of us, having received our vaccinations, did venture on their own to fish. In the last newsletter, we reported that the fish may have been social distancing as well because the bite was not very good. However, February was different, largely because of the opening of trout fishing in San Pablo Reservoir. Carl Moyer and Stan Wong limited out on one trip. Brion Beetz and Phil Scimonelli made several trips to the reservoir and caught at least three fish each time fishing from shore and **Bob Lively** caught trout from his kayak. Phil moved over to Lafayette Reservoir on one occasion and caught three more from shore. Martin Steinpress of Branch 146 also was successful fly fishing on the Stanislaus River. The only negative report came from Contra Loma Reservoir. Ron Lew of Branch 146 rode around the lake on his bicycle. The lake looked beautiful, there were many fishermen, but it appeared that there were no fish being caught.

There was also activity in the Delta where **Mike Corker** and **Tom Kostik** fished for stripers. **Mike** landed a dozen fish, but only one was a keeper. **Tom** caught less fish, but netted four keepers. **Harry Sherinian** fished in Honkers Bay, an arm of the Delta, and caught a large number of stripers with two keepers. **Terry Miller** and his son made one trip to the Delta and snared many stripers, but all were small.

We hope that you can join us at future monthly meetings. For the moment, the meetings are on Zoom and so you can watch from the comfort of your home. We join in breakout rooms of eight or nine fishermen and talk about fishing and life in general and then reconvene for group business and to describe our most recent trips. We are all looking forward to seeing one another in person in 2021. All of us continue to miss the fun as well as the different treats and super snacks that have been provided by the hosts each month.



The SIR146 Book Group met online via Zoom on Monday, February 22nd. Our Zoom Master continues to be **Mike Farrar** – thank you **Mike**.

Our chosen book for February was *Interior Chinatown*. The author was Charles Yu, a graduate of UC Berkeley and Columbia Law. Mr. Yu has a broad resume' of TV scripts, books, and newspaper articles, including this book, which is the winner of the 2020 National Book Award.

Our group gave it mixed reviews, and for some of us it was not an easy read, as the story was "brilliantly weaving in and out of screenplays and set pieces." I found it difficult to understand until I read the reviews available on the Amazon web site.

The story focused on the main character Willus Wu and his travails as goes through life attempting to be the ultimate Asian actor, "Kung Fu Man" – yes, a stereotype that pervades the book as the author moves through his message of living under racism with all its noxious layers, and perceptions, particularly of Asian men, in this the supposed promised land."

Of course nobody can be a "Kung Fu" Man forever (he had worked his way up from "dead body"). So, as a married man with children, he had to make his decision on what to do with his life. This decision came about as he was acting in show called "Black and White," which stars two cops, one black and one white, where he is in the background, but the spotlight turns to him, and then he realizes that he must determine what direction his life must take.

Much of his life he and his wife lived in one of the infamous "SRO" (single room occupancy) hotels that was above the restaurant where they both worked, he in the kitchen, and she in the "front of the house." The other residents of the multi-story hotel were and interesting and colorful cast of characters.

The author finds a way to discuss the differences between the Black and Asian life experiences and history in this country, neither he sees as exemplary as people try to become the "Generic Man" and not the Generic Asian Man." However, at the end he seems to hold out hope that this can happen.

Our group is giving this book a "qualified" recommendation. It can be a bit of struggle (at some point read the reviews for a better understanding), but one needs an open mind to deal with the contradictions and situations in this story.

Our next book will be *The Song of Achilles* by Madeline Miller. The March meeting will be on Zoom, on Monday, March 22nd.
