

The Branch Honors Super Senior Bob Burley on Turning 95!!

Our Honoree presentation at the April 14th luncheon was for **Bob Burley** as he turns 95 in May of this year. Being the bright guys that you are, you have already figured out that we are awarding the "Super Senior SIR" early, as we have traditionally not complicated the spirit of the Ladies Day Luncheon with business matters such as Honoree Awards.



Bob was born on May 19, 1927 in a farm house east of Lancaster, California with the aid of a midwife. **Bob** tells us that a country doctor came by a day or two later to collect his \$5 to fill out a birth certificate. **Bob** stayed in the Antelope Valley for the next eighteen years, attending a 4 room grade school with 4 very good teachers through 8th grade. He next took long bus rides to attend a high school that was 11 miles away and it covered a 50 square mile radius.

Bob's high school advisor predicted that he would fail, but instead he graduated with honors and was accepted at Occidental College. However, his college career was immediately cut short by the draft. He was sent to Camp Roberts for infantry training and was about to set sail for fighting in Japan when the atomic bomb led to the Japanese surrender. Instead he was sent to Korea as part of the occupation army. About a year later in Korea, **Bob** was discharged and returned to Occidental College.

He earned his bachelor's degree there and then went on to dental school at the University of Southern California. In 1954, **Bob** took his dental board exams and married **Sally Reynolds**. They moved to Walnut Creek where Bob opened a dental practice and he never left. **Bob** and **Sally** have 3 children, Brian, Steve, and Cheryl. They all live in the Bay Area and each has 2 children...thus, 4 granddaughters and 2 grandsons.

Bob joined SIR Branch 146 over 20 years ago on July 12, 2001, sponsored by **Douglas Carlson**. We proudly congratulate **Bob** who will become a "Super Senior Sir" this May of 2022.





AREA 16 Fishing Report Paul DuBow

The primary area for our fishing activities in April was the Delta and San Francisco Bay where we were able to find both halibut and stripers with some very good results. Although the salmon and rockfish seasons opened at the

beginning of April, we did not try our luck in that area because of a generally rough ocean. We hope to have reports of salmon and rockfish trips in the next issue. However, the salmon season is split with a closure during most of June. Here are some of the results of our endeavors:

Ron Lew of Branch 146 fished with a friend in the Delta and caught several stripers.

Lee Clark of Branch 146, along with Carl Moyer and Gordon Linebaugh, caught halibut fishing from party boats in the Bay.

Mike Corker fished in Honkers Bay, an arm of the Delta near Suisun City, and caught several stripers but just one catfish hookups made his day.

Rich Fiscina of Branch 146 fished with Pedro Contreras and Ken Bellindir on Pedro's boat in the Bay and caught three halibut, one of which was a keeper (over 22 inches) and lots of stripers, none of which was a keeper. Unfortunately, a halibut in the vicinity of 10 lbs. that was hooked by Rich was lost in the attempt to net it.

Tom Kostik made four trips to the Delta and landed 25 stripers and 17 catfish, all of which he released. He also fished in Spoonbill Creek, an arm of the Delta, where he caught six stripers, four of which were keepers.

Mike Browne of Branch 146 and Phil Scimonelli caught striper shakers (fish below the minimum size) at Eckley Pier on San Pablo Bay. Phil also caught about 50 shakers on the Antioch-Oakley pier, his favorite shore fishing venue. One was a tantalizing 17 ½ inches. Bear in mind while these shakers are under the minimum and are required to be released, they are not small fish and fight very well.

Chuck Vanoncini journeyed several miles up the Sacramento River and caught seven stripers. Four were keepers, two of which were released.

Paul Dubow and Mike Browne of Branch 146, along with

Dave Havlik, Phil Scimonelli, Carl Moyer, and Gordon Linebaugh fished on the Scallywag, a six pack, and caught 23 halibut, nine of which were keepers. On the following day, Paul and Gordon joined Karl Droese, Ken Fischer, and Dick Thomson on the Sacramento River near Rio Vista, where they caught 19 stripers, of which ten were keepers. The largest was a 10 pounder that Paul caught on his first cast of the day.

Stan Wong caught a small halibut on the Eckley Pier and then picked up three keeper stripers fishing from the shore at Benicia.

We also had some action in the fresh water arena. Carl Moyer, Gordon Linebaugh, and Phil Scimonelli caught rainbow trout in San Pablo Reservoir. A group of eight that included Mike Browne of Branch 146 spent two days at Tom Chapman's vacation home in the Sierras and fished in New Melones Reservoir where they caught 11 kokanee and near limits of trout (including one brown trout) on the first day and 35 black bass on the second day.

Six members of the Branch's Book Group met Monday, April 18th, at the Greenery. Our book for discussion was The Night Watchman, by Louise Erdich. The book earned

a Pulitzer Prize, but this award may have been for the author's whole body of work, and not just for this particular book. The author is the daughter of a Chippewa mother and a German-American father.

The main setting for this book is the Turtle Mountain Reservation in the north-east corner of North Dakota adjacent match falls through, he becomes concerned about Patrice, to the Canadian border in the early 1950's. While there are two main characters, Thomas and Patrice, there are many "side stories" that the reader may find distracting.

Thomas Wazhashk is the night watchman at a defense plant that employs many Native American women in what seems to be the manufacture of components for missile guidance systems. She provides much of the financial support for her family by working on the assembly line at the factory. She does have obligations at home and is much loved by her family. Her main concern is the fate of her sister Vera, her baby, and her husband, who seemingly disappeared into the big for jobs.

The book meanders with several side stories of boxing sion is the result of the author's possible antipathy toward the book to those who have an interest in Native Ameri-Mormons. It happens that the senator (a real person) who introduced the bill was a Mormon who displayed enmity-

toward Native Americans during his entire career.

Patrice takes it upon herself to travel to Minneapolis to find her sister Vera and her baby, and rescue them if necessary. She uses her sick leave from work, along with days donated by her co-workers, gets her savings from under the floor boards, and armed with a couple of names and addresses, takes the train to Minneapolis. There she finds out what a tough life it is for Native American women, and she begins to see the lurid side of the sex-trafficking business, but persists in her quest. The relative, who probably was in the sex trafficking business, gives Vera's baby to Patrice and Wood Mountain, who take the baby home to live with Patrice and her family. Wood Mountain becomes a better friend and helps a lot with the baby.

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




